There are only two desert routes into Egypt. One is south from the sea coast to Ismalia, and the other via Akaba and across the Sinai Peninsular, but wells are few and far between and the problem of transportation of supplies for an invading army by these two routes is practically insuperable.

Apart from the arrival of the Indians, the never-ending procession of troops sips and warships through the Suez Canal, and the numbers of the troops sent to replace the old garrisons, have practically convinced the population that this is no time to rise against the British. Despite the activities of "Young Egyptian" and "Young Turk" revolutionaries, the great mass of the people are contented under British rule, and see no reason for changing it for the rule of Constantinople and the unknown Kaiser in Berlin.


