REORGANIZATION OF CHURCH IN MARITIMES TOLD

Rev. F. G. Mackintosh
Speaks at Presbyterian
Assembly

HITS UNIONISTS

Declares Efforts Made to Con-
trol Young People Through
Y. M. C. A.

MONTREAL, June 8.—Rev. F. G. Mackintosh, of New Glasgow, N. S., told of the reorganization of the church in the Maritimes, following union, at the Presbyterian General Assembly last night. The congregations were willing to start in a small way. If there was no church available for worship, a house was used. The situation was accepted as it was, and the best made of it. Industry in the Maritimes might take a lesson from the church in the manner in which the latter was willing to work with what was at hand and to function in a small way until the situation could be improved.

Sunday schools and women's missionary societies were started as a beginning. Today in Truro and Moncton there were congregations of 500.

CAPTURE YOUNG PEOPLE

The Unionists, the speaker declared, thought they had captured the young people. Pine Hill had sent a professor to Dalhousie and the Ladies' College, and Unionists controlled the Y. M. C. A.

"We are not going to allow them to control the Y. M. C. A." Mr. Mackintosh declared.

The young people, he went on, had intuitively seen injustice and many were throwing in their lot with the Presbyterian church. He paid tribute to the women of the provinces, saying they had carried the church on their backs in the days of crisis.

Churches had been obtained in Halifax and Westville, Mr. Mackintosh said, and in Sydney more than \$22,000 had been raised as a building fund.

YORK ON P. E. I.

In Prince Edward Island an amendment to the Church Union Act had been obtained, by which eight or nine churches remained to the Presbyterians which otherwise would have been swept into union.

In Newfoundland, contained Mr. Mackintosh, not one vote had been cast against Union.

"But the funny thing is this, the Presbyterians and Congregationalists did not vote. Only the Methodists voted."

TURKISH ASSEMBLY RATIFIES TREATY

Dispute With Great Britain Over
Mosul is Settled at
Last

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 8.—The National Assembly at Ankara, the Turkish capital, has ratified the treaty between Great Britain and Turkey, settling the dispute over Mosul.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, addressing the League of Nations Council in Geneva yesterday, said that under the treaty, a small strip of territory was ceded to Turkey. The frontier would be delimited on the spot by a commission under a chairman to be chosen by the president of Switzerland.

MOVE TO RESTRICT NARCOTIC SALES

Bill Considered to Make Pre-
scription Necessary For Drug-
gist to Sell

OTTAWA, Ont., June 8.—An act to amend the opium and narcotic drug act, passed the committee stage and now stands for third reading in the House of Commons last night. Hon. J. C. Elliott, Minister of Health, explained that the purpose of the bill was to make it impossible for a retail druggist to sell narcotics without a written order from a doctor, dentist or veterinarian. It was to assist in attaching responsibility for violations of the act.

FRENCH PLACE RESTRICTIONS ON NECESSITIES

Bake Shops Expected
to Close One Day
a Week

CAKE IS RATIONED

Committee of Four From Cab-
inet Accepts Delicate Task
in Emergency

PARIS, June 8.—The period of "sackcloth and ashes" predicted some time ago by Joseph Caillaux, former Minister of Finance, is upon France, and the public accepts it with resignation but reluctance. It is connected with the battle to save the franc and it anticipates restrictions in the consumption of bread, meat and other necessities.

A committee of four—Minister of Public Works De Monzie, Minister of Commerce Daniel Vincent, Minister of Agriculture Bimet and Minister of the Interior Durand—which will manage the regime of restrictions, started its work today.

DIFFICULT JOB.

The ministers will tread their way warily, for they realize they are on delicate ground and that hasty measures will defeat their own ends. They know that increased tariff barriers will provoke reprisals abroad to the detriment of France's export trade, that restrictions carried too far will have a bad effect on home industries and frighten away tourists.

Bake shops, it is expected, will close one day each week. Fancy bread and rolls will be prohibited and flour for cakes and pastry severely rationed. Butcher shops will close once and perhaps twice weekly.

There are to be no bread cards, which it would take time and money to print and distribute. There may, however, be cards for articles imported in large quantities, such as gasoline, coffee, sugar, wool cotton and coal, notably British hard coal.

Undesirable Aliens To Be Deported

NEW YORK, June 8.—(United Press)—One hundred and forty "undesirable aliens" are at Ellis Island awaiting deportation. They were brought to the historic gateway Mon-

day, after being gathered in a nationwide round-up. Included in the group are criminals, anarchists, insane, white slavers, border jumpers and bootleggers. More than half the number are women and children.

DEXTER COOPER BILL GOES TO COMMITTEE

Second Reading in Senate
Moved by Hon. C. W. Robinson

OTTAWA, June 8.—In the Senate last night, Senator C. W. Robinson moved the second reading of the bill to incorporate the Dexter P. Cooper Company, which is applying for a charter for tidal power development on Passamaquoddy Bay. This is an international project between the State of Maine and New Brunswick. It will cost from \$70,000,000 to \$100,000,000 and power developed from 600,000 H. P. to 700,000 H. P. It will give employment to 5,000 men for four years.

The bill was referred to the committee on railways and harbors before which the promoters will appear.
