LORENZ TREATS TWO WITHOUT USE OF KNIFE

Surgeon Duplicates Lolita Armour Operation on Girl and Aids a Knock-kneed Newsboy—Free Clinic 4 Days a Week.

(New York Times)

Hundreds of cripples young and old again took to the streets of New York yesterday, in search of treatment by Dr. Adolf Lorenz, Viennese orthopedic specialist. Of this number only two went to the operating room, where Dr. Lorenz, with one of his assistants, duplicated the operation he performed fifteen years ago on Lolita Armour of Chicago. His other little patient was a newsboy, Ralph Gibbons, twelve, of 12 West 127th street.

Veronica was operated on for dual congenital dislocation of the hip and Dr. Lorenz treated for an aggravated condition of knock-knees resulting from infantile paralysis, which left him crippled at the age of four. Both operations were knifless, because Dr. Lorenz began his treatment with manipulation of the bones.

Dr. Lorenz returned in the afternoon to the Murray Hill Hotel to rest from his continuous labors. Later he saw a number of patients there, and just before six o'clock went to the Hotel Ansonia, where he was called into consultation by Dr. Irwin Alpert in the case of Mrs. Max Nast.

It was announced that Dr. Lorenz would hold free clinics at Bellevue Hospital from three to five p. m. next Tuesday and Saturday under the auspices of the City of New York. Likewise came an announcement from St. Mark's Hospital, Second Avenue and Eleventh street, that Dr. Lorenz would hold clinics at that institution on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The crowds waiting for him at the hospital yesterday stood four abreast and stretched blocks away. Police were sent to guard the doors of the hospital, and Dr. Lorenz himself started inspecting the line to pick out cases in most urgent need of treatment. Dr. Lorenz said that the operating room at St. Mark's Hospital for joint diseases would be increased gradually as soon as the new building was completed.

The two operations performed yesterday were watched with profound interest by the medical students of the University of New York. Dr. Lorenz decided to correct the dislocation of the hip by the use of the sound manipulation. For fifteen minutes he rotated the femur bones in their sockets at the hips, first one and then the other, being forced back into place. The right thigh bone went back to its socket with a sharp snap which pleased the surgeon, but the left returned to its socket less audibly, causing Dr. Lorenz to frown with displeasure. He explained that the probability of cure varied with the sound of the snap as the bones were thrust back into normal position.

The newsboy was stretched upon a table with his left ankle propped up with a block about six inches high. Dr. Lorenz put his elbow on the table and cap and threw his weight upon the member. The limb was sprung up and down repeatedly. The patient was turned over to permit further manipulation from a different angle, the object of the operation being to spring the knee back to normal by force of stretching of the ligaments.

When the manipulation of both legs was completed the small patient was turned over to surgeons, who made plaster casts to hold the knees in the corrected positions. The Gibbons boy will have to wear the cast for six months. The little girl was also put in a cast, her treatment to continue over a period of eighteen months.

Invitations were received by Dr. Lorenz to visit many cities of the United States. The mayor of Detroit offered to put the hospitals of that city at the surgeon's disposal. Dr. Lorenz was also invited to visit Chicago at Christmas to spend about a month there, and in other cities of the middle west. From there he will go to the Pacific coast for four or six weeks, returning here.

FAMOUS PICTURES IN PERIL

Remington Canvases Buried Under Ruins When Library Burns.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Nov. 30.—The famous Western paintings of Frederick Remington, the artist, may be lost to posterity, the result of a fire which destroyed the new Public Library in Ogdensburg with a loss of \$50,000.

The paintings were in the basement of the wrecked building. For six hours the firemen played water on the burning canvas and it is feared that the water may have filtered into the vault and ruined the paintings. The collection of other Remington souvenirs was housed in another building nearby and was undamaged.

MORE PROMINENT GERMANS VISIT BRITISH CAPITAL

Anxiety in Financial Quarters and Revision of Reparations Payment May be Urged.

(Canadian Press Cable)

London, Nov. 30.—A visit to London by Doctor Walter Rathenau, former German minister of reconstruction, and his secretary, Dr. Simon, well known as an economic expert, following closely on last week's visit by Hugo Stinnes, German financier, is accepted in official and banking circles as heralding an early discussion, and possibly revision, of the arrangements for Germany's reparations payments.

The arrival of the German agents yesterday was due to supreme anxiety in financial quarters, where Germany's ability to meet the approaching reparations instalment has been a foremost topic during recent weeks.

What is believed here to be the desire of the British government to bring about a new discussion of the subject of reparations is generally regarded as being due as much to domestic trade considerations as to a realization of the precarious situation Germany would have to confront should the stipulated payment during recent weeks.

The plan probably will entail deferment of Germany's payments; and there are reports in circulation that the British member of the reparations commission already has placed before the British government a proposal for a two-year or a three-year moratorium.

Paris, Nov. 30.—A despatch to the Petit Parisien from Berlin says the visit of Dr. Walter Rathenau and Dr. Simon to London was decided on during a session of the German committee on foreign affairs. They are not to take up again the negotiations which have been carried on by Hugo Stinnes, but will examine with the British government into the possibility of an Anglo-German agreement similar to the Wiesbaden agreement between Germany and France.
