TEETH AND MATRIMONY.
Dental Surgery Has Improved So That Jaws Can Keep Their Secrets, Says Dentist.

False teeth are no longer a bar to matrimony, according to Dr. C. C. Phelps of St. Louis, Mo., who is at the Park Avenue Hotel. Dr. Phelps says it is possible for a husband or wife to be in possession of a substitute set of "uppers" or "lowers," or both, without the other knowing anything about it.

"Dental surgery has improved greatly during the last ten years," said Dr. Phelps. "Where it used to be prudent and, in fact, the only thing to do was to remove false teeth at night, it is now not only possible, but more practical to have them made to be worn every hour of the twenty-four. If the teeth are removed over night, the muscles of the mouth relax and sag, impairing the service the teeth should render. Modern false teeth should never be removed except for cleaning."

She recently broke her plate for me to finish a new one, so that she could go home and not have hubby discover her secret. She succeeded all right, but she now has another set hidden away at home for emergency purposes."

TWO STILLS SEIZED JUST OFF FIFTH AV.

Dry Agents Arrest Chemist and Wife in Their West 39th Street Home—Brooklyn Woman is Held.

(New York Times.)
Prohibition agents confiscated two stills and a quantity of bootleg whiskey and mash which they found yesterday on the top floor of 28 West Thirty-ninth street, a few doors from Fifth avenue. The stills had been in operation for more than a year, the agents said they had been informed. Frank Kines, fifty-two years old, a chemist, and Martha Kines, his wife, were arrested on a charge of violating the Volstead act.

After watching the premises for several days, Agents Sassi, Ardison and Weissberg said they rang the door bell yesterday morning and purchased two pints of whiskey for \$5 from a woman who they later identified as Mrs. Kines. The agents then obtained a search warrant, returning several hours later. They said that when they broke into Kines' apartment on the top floor they found a thirty-gallon still in actual operation. It was filled with a steaming liquid.

The agents confiscated this still and a smaller one holding eight gallons. They also seized nine barrels of mash, twenty-five gallons of grain alcohol, twelve gallons of pure juice, ten gross bottles and several bottles of coloring. Kines admitted to the agents and newspapermen that he owned the outfit. He seemed much more concerned over the accuracy of the figures given out regarding his "distilling" than over his predicament.

Mrs. Marian Strayemka, 482 Rodney street, Brooklyn, was arrested by Police Sergeant Lowe, who alleged he found a still, mash and alcohol in her home. She was charged with violating the prohibition law.

"The government has not produced a prohibition agent willing to fight men of fighting calibre do not seek prohibition jobs," said F. H. LaGuardia, former president of the board of aldermen, in the Tombs court. He appeared as counsel for Robert Santangelo, a student at the Columbia University Law School, charged by Prohibition Agent Robert J. Owen with having a revolver in his possession last week, when Owens visited a soft drink establishment operated by Santangelo's father at 58 Oak street. Magistrate Oberwager discharged the defendant for lack of evidence.

In explaining to the Bayonne authorities why he had made so many applications recently to open sewers, James Loomis, a local plumbing contractor, said home brewers are clogging up the pipes by dumping the malt and hops residue into their sinks. The authorities described the increase of applications as "phenomenal."

The steamer Javary, seized last December when the government confiscated grain alcohol valued at \$300,000, was sold at auction yesterday by United States Marshal Hecht at Stapleton, S. I., for \$15,000, to the Garland Steamship Company, 811 Fifth avenue, which had a lien on the vessel. The Javary was built fourteen years ago at a cost of \$300,000.

A bottle of home brew exploded in the right hand of Patrolman David King of the Newtown precinct, injuring it so badly that he had to be taken to St. John's Hospital for treatment. King was in charge of a police department automobile load of confiscated liquor. On Queens Boulevard the load shifted and King was re-arranging bottles and kegs. Early yesterday there was a loud explosion in 126 Hudson street, Jersey City. When the fire department had extinguished a blaze which followed, the police discovered five forty-gallon stills and twenty fifteen-gallon, a quantity of bootleg liquor.

Posing as members of the auto squad, Federal Prohibition Agent James H. Wilson and George Hall made a raid on a garage in West Twentieth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, where they said they found six barrels and eleven five-gallon cans of grain alcohol and seven cases of whiskey. The agents left summonses for Jacob Kessler and A. Lazareff, reputed owners of the goods.

What was believed to be the largest still in Northern New Jersey—of 100 gallons capacity—was discovered by government agents yesterday afternoon in a small building in the rear of a hotel owned by Daniel Hopfinger, on Lodi road, Wallington. Dry agents also confiscated 101 barrels of mash and twenty-five five-gallon cans of alcohol. The building was rented two months ago by two men, whose names Hopfinger said he did not know.

FOUR SPECIALISTS AND X-RAY TESTS

The St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis announced yesterday the personnel of the corps of visiting specialists who will conduct the free examinations next week at the four health centres arranged for in the city.

Dr. A. F. Miller, superintendent of the Nova Scotia provincial sanitarium at Kentville, is one of the visitors. An added feature will be the fact that Dr. Miller will bring with him full X-ray equipment and an expert assistant to conduct investigation of suspected chest cases. Dr. Miller has been twelve years

Appeals to the Wisconsin Regents Against Prof. Scott's "Discourtesy" on Questionnaire.

Madison, Wis., March 29.—Thomas A. Edison has transmitted to members of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin copies of correspondence between him and Professor W. A. Scott or the university, with the suggestion that the professor's letters were discourteous.

From the correspondence it appears that Edison's recent questionnaire on financial subjects, notable in which was the implication that stored commodities were as sound a basis for paper money as a gold reserve, was sent to the professor, but elicited no reply, that Edison wrote to the professor again and urged him to answer the questions, whereupon the professor replied, disparaging the questionnaire, and intimating that Edison lacked instruction in elementary principles.

"It is my belief, however," said Professor Scott, "that any good treatise, served at Halifax as administrator for the Massachusetts Health Association. Dr. D. A. Carmichael, superintendent of the River Glade Sanitarium, is the fourth of the visitors and is a specialist with wide experience. Dr. Carmichael spent a year abroad specializing in tuberculosis treatment. He then served in Muskoka Cottage Hospital and with Dr. G. D. Parritt at Gravenhurst. He has been superintendent at River Glade for four years.

Members of the Board of Regents who receive copies of the correspondence between Professor Scott and Mr. Edison express the opinion that the letter written by the professor had been "very unfortunate," adding that they intended to suggest an investigation of the matter at the next board meeting.

The Cape Town wine growers threaten to secede from the Dutch Reform church, which supports the movement for local option. It is believed that the government is not averse to prohibition, as it hopes to placate the wine growers by offering them compensation if their vines are uprooted and replaced by cereals.
