



Constantinople, Feb. 12—(By the Associated Press)—Advices received here show that the city of Odessa fell into the hands of the Bolsheviki at three o'clock in the afternoon of Feb. 7. Heavy machine gun fire was in evidence all day on the 7th. The fire of the Bolsheviki upon the Allied warships was heavy, and the vessels moved into the outer harbor,
