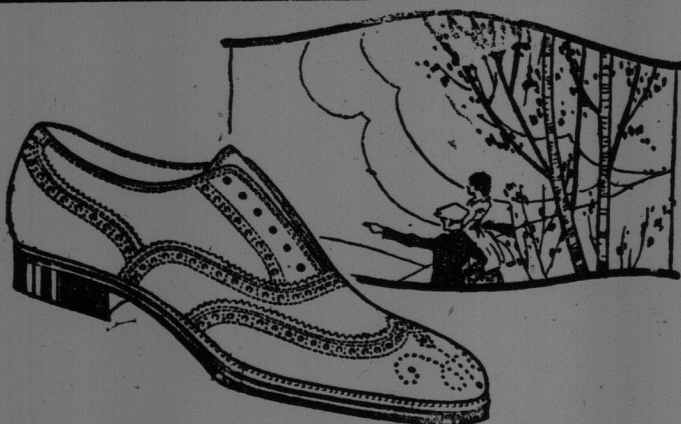

### SAY MUSIC HATH CHARMS TO CURE THE SAVAGE GRIPPE

Paris, May 14—"Music hath charms to cure the savage gripe," is the latest slogan of a group of Spanish doctors who have invaded the medical world of Paris. Recently when an outbreak of gripe at Madrid included the unusual symptoms of sleeping sickness, the doctors tried an

experiment on a patient, a prominent banker. They carried him, asleep, to a dark room. They called in two musicians, who commenced to play soft melodies on guitars. After two hours' slumber under the lulling music the patient awoke, and the next day was completely cured. The Spanish medical group in Paris declare the "music cure" is infallible for all forms of encephalitis and sleeping gripe.

### FAYORS CHINA IN SHANTUNG MATTER

British Chamber of Commerce Follows Lead of American Commercial Organizations.

Shanghai, April 19—(A. P. Correspondence)—The British Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai, representing the bulk of British interests in the Far East, has put itself on record as in favor of China's claims in the Shantung controversy. This is in line with action taken by American commercial organizations in China and is regarded as significant in view of the fact that a part of the English commercial enterprises in the Orient are linked with the Japanese.

"This chamber," declared A. W. Burkill, chairman of the British chamber's directorate, in his address at the annual meeting, "is in full sympathy with China in her very natural desire to have control of this province returned to her."

"When one takes into consideration that Japan in taking Tsingtao with the help of British troops, was only doing her part as ally, her present attitude is hard to understand."

"She is taking deliberate steps to control the whole of the land surrounding the harbor, docks, wharves and railroad terminals, and every obstacle is put in the way of other nationals of acquiring any property in what undoubtedly is the business centre. This policy can only be construed in one way, viz., that Japan is not going to allow any other nation to have an opportunity of trading on fair and equal terms with her own nationals. We, none of us, want any special consideration; all we ask for is to be allowed to do business on an equal footing."

### DR. McALLISTER'S HORSES

Sussex Record: Dr. D. H. McAllister will send his string of racing horses to Fredericton today in charge of trainer Fred J. Cameron, accompanied by helpers Leo Lapond of Montreal and John Finnigan of Sussex. The speedy ones going from here are Fern Hal, Jenny Pen and Victoria, and these will be joined on the Fredericton race track, where the doctor's string will be trained, by a fast green one not yet named. Dr. McAllister is not going away with the horses; he intends remaining at home this summer.

A., principal of the Sussex Grammar school, has accepted the position of school inspector for the inspectorial district of St. John and Charlotte counties, made vacant by the resignation of William McLean. 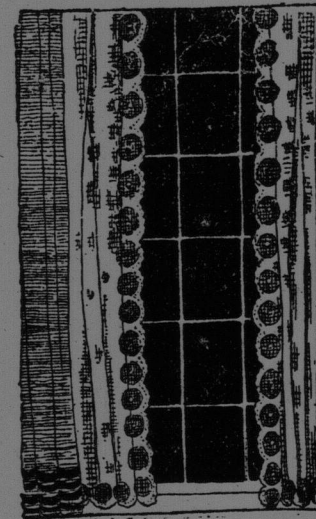
