Rome, Jan. 4.—In a striking address delivered in the chamber of deputies in reply to the welcome extended to him yesterday, President Wilson said:

"There is only one thing that holds nations together, if you exclude force, and that is friendship and good will. The only thing that binds men together is friendship and, by the same token, the only thing that binds nations together is friendship."

"We know that there cannot be any other balance of power. That has been tried and found wanting, for the best of all reasons that it does not stay balanced. It is a weight which does not hold together and cannot constitute a makeshift in the affairs of men."

ARMEN ESCORT BODY OF NOTED COMRADE TO GRAVE

London, Jan. 3.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuters.) The funeral of Captain Lee Robinson, V. C., an English aviator who destroyed the first Zeppelin brought down in England and who died of influenza soon after his return to England after internment in Germany, took place this afternoon at Harrow Weald, and presented some remarkable features.

A flight of airplanes escorted the cortege to the cemetery some miles distant. The coffin was borne on an airplane trailer. An air force band preceded the coffin and a squadron of members of the air force marched behind.
