Willard and Dempsey Select Boxing Partners for Training Camps

signature of Jack Dempsey to the articles of agreement for the championship bout with Jess Willard. The principals and others crossed from New York to the Jersey side before signing in order to be within the law. Under the agreement Dempsey is to get \$27,500 and one-third of the picture rights, while Willard is to get \$100,000 and one-third of the picture privileges. The articles call for a bout not to exceed forty rounds.

Now that Dempsey has decided to select Willard as one of his sparring partners it will be interesting to note how the two shape up together and whether Dempsey really has anything to fear from his formidable rival. Willard is at the top of his form. He is a splendidly built athlete, with a world of speed and science as well as the ability to hit with knockout force.

As Dempsey is a boxer who does not know what it is to spar lightly for points, his bouts with Willard are likely to develop into something more than the usual exhibitions between master and man. When Dempsey was training for his bout with Fulton he used to slam big Battling Jim Johnson for keeps, and it is not likely that Willard will be treated in the same fashion without replying with spirit.

The selection of Willard is a good indication of the amount of confidence that Dempsey has in himself. If he were not loaded down with confidence in his own ability he hardly would care to take a chance by having such a dangerous man around his camp.

Willard also has sent out a call for sparring partners, but the chances are that Walter Monahan, who helped train him for the Johnson bout but later acted as his sparring partner during the champion's circus days, will be back on the job. At present Monahan is in uniform, but Willard expects to obtain his release in the near future.

Willard's views regarding sparring partners are different from those of Dempsey. The big fellow prefers to have men in his camp whom he knows well, and who will not try to sneak one over when he is not looking. Willard always goes easy with his sparring mates, and there is nothing ferocious about the big fellow and the boxing he does while training in no way resembling a real scrap.

ELABORATE PLOT TO SUPPLY GERMANY

K. & E. Neumond Used First Their Own Name, Then Others in Plan of Sending Cargoes of Food.

London, Feb. 10—What the British attorney-general describes as the most expensive, sustained and carefully organized effort to "supply the Central Empires with foodstuffs yet proposed" came up in the prize court today. The foodstuffs are valued at \$1,415,000 and were contained in shipments covering a period of eighteen months.

Fourteen ships were engaged in the attempt. Two of these were vessels of American register, four were Norwegian, four Swedish and four Danish. The crown attorney suggested that, although the names of different persons appear as shippers, all the consignments were in fact made by K. & E. Neumond, of New York and Frankfurt, acting for the German government.

He charged that the cargoes shipped on the steamers Dorico and Henri were intended for capture by the Germans, while the cargoes on the other boats were to be forwarded to Germany through Denmark.

The crown attorney stated that earlier in the war and prior to the present case the Neumonds had been held in the prize court to have acted as agents of the German government. He charged that in the present case, the Neumonds had perjured themselves in their own affidavits on the bills of lading. This, the attorney declared, amounted to the fabrication of false papers. He asserted that an elaborate code was used in connection with the transaction.

SAYS NOVA SCOTIA IS LEADER IN IMPROVING HIGHWAYS OF PROVINCE

Hon. H. H. Wickwire Tells of Work Done by Government to Better Roads

Halifax (Herald). That Nova Scotia had gone farther than any other province of Canada in the matter of a practical good roads policy was the keynote of a short address last evening by Hon. H. H. Wickwire, minister of public highways, to the county roads superintendent and local officials at a banquet held in the Tally-Ho. There were thirty men present to devise plans of organization which they have been engaged in the last two days. In the course of his short speech Mr. Wickwire said:

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
