

HOULTON WOMEN IN OLD TIME DRESS; UNIQUE ENTERTAINMENT

A unique entertainment, The Century of Dress was given in Watson Hall Houlton by the Houlton Woman's club the other afternoon at which the changes in American dress from 1800 to the present time—or from the date Houlton was settled up to today—were portrayed. The hall was crowded. Extra seats were placed on the sides, but a large number were obliged to stand.

Mrs. Bertha Burleigh, who had charge of the program and who was gowned in a vivid green silk, cut in the mode which prevailed in the late sixties, the same gown having been worn at President Grant's inauguration, began by telling the audience of the changes which are decreed each year by Dame Fashion.

Upon the conclusion of Mrs. Putnam's remarks an orchestra composed of Mrs. Fred Pond at the piano, Mrs. Archie Dill, violin, and Harold Chadwick, cello accompanied the music members of the club, gowned in costumes of long ago, entered one by one from the rear of the hall at intervals of two minutes. All eyes were fixed curiously upon them as they walked slowly down the centre aisle.

The first figure to appear was that of Mrs. Allen T. Smith as Miss Hepstah Peacedale, gowned in a brown silk of the period of 1818. She wore an enormous white silk poke bonnet, adorned with cherry ribbon and a feather.

Presently Mrs. Don A. H. Powers, representing Miss Charity Spooner, arrived, wearing a bright brocade striped silk with puffed sleeves and a diminutive antique bonnet with lace trim in front and carried a huge muff of bear skin which was over 150 years old.
