New England Batters
Jimmy Magee, of Lowell, continues to be the best batter in the New England League, despite the fact that he fell off 26 points last week. He is the only regular player all the season who is above the 400 mark, his average being 406. Burroughs, a Lowell pitcher, who has been used for pinch hitting, is on top of the list with an average of 420, but of the list with only five games, in which he has been to bat only seven times. O'Brien, another of the Fall River connection, is hitting for 407 in seven games. Carroll of Worcester, who has been contending with Magee all season for the leading honors, fell off 12 points last week, but is still ranking next to the Lowell slugger, although 20 points behind. Stewart of Worcester continues to be well up with the leaders, where he has been all season.

The best work of the week was done by Pumphrey, of Portland, Moulton of Lynn, and Shorten of Worcester, all of whom jumped into the 300 class. Pumphrey boosted his average from 278 to 302; Shorten, from 276 to 282, and Moulton, from 284 to 286. There are thirty-one batters in the 300 class, the same number as a week ago. Of this number Lowell has seven, Worcester five, Brockton and Fall River four, New Bedford, Lawrence and Portland three each, and Lynn two. Henderson of Lowell spoiled his undefeated pitching record of a week ago by losing to Brockton on his home ground last Monday. He won his first game during the week. Bates of Worcester won both his games and now has a record of three victories and no defeats. Swapp of Brockton and Knapp of Fall River have each won the only game pitched.

Pearson, the Lawrence veteran, and Henderson, have each won five of their 15 games, while Meritt of Lawrence won nine out of 11. Anderson of Milton, on a second division team, has done a great showing with seven victories in 10 games.

Clemens of Lowell, who led the league in runs last year, has broken the tie with Magee of the same team, and now leads with thirty-six runs in thirty-seven games. Magee and Callahan are tied for second with thirty-three each. Luster of Lawrence is close behind with thirty-two. He led the league in stolen bases in 1912. Hickman, of Portland, so led the league in this respect several years ago, taking the lead with sixteen. Howard of Brockton is second with thirteen, and then come Meritt of Portland, Clemens and Miller of Lowell, and McGovern of Fall River, each with twelve.
