### SCHOLARSHIP IS ACCEPTED

Offer of St. Vincent's Alumnae Before School Board—Old Newman School Sold for \$200.

The regular meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held last evening with Hon. H. A. McKeown presiding. The offer of the St. Vincent's alumnae to give a scholarship of \$100 to the pupil making the highest mark in the platform was accepted. It was announced that the sale of the old Newman street school had realized \$200. A request that the class room in St. Vincent's Convent be better lighted was referred to the visitors. A committee was appointed to report on a new name for the new Albert School.

The Easter holidays were arranged for a Gordon Leavitt, acting superintendent, reported an unusual amount of sickness. M. Call moved an increase of \$100 in the salary of the trustee officer. This was seconded by Thomas Nagle and passed after some discussion. Authority was given for the extension of the platform of the new Albert School by five feet.

At a teachers' committee meeting it was agreed that Sister H. Barbara of Holy Trinity school should receive a salary of \$1,600.

Applications for positions on the teaching staff were received from Miss Gertrude S. Lumsden of Halifax, Miss Annie E. Penwarden, of Harcourt, Normal School students; Miss G. Parkinson, Miss Muriel L. Hawker, Miss J. E. Corbett, Miss Evelyn M. Hanson, Miss Hazel E. Hennessey, Miss Emma L. Chestnut and Miss Louise Fleigher, the latter of Queen's University, and Miss Margaret Putnam and Gordon Titus.

The vocational education board wrote to accept the invitation to hold the vocational summer school in St. John this year.

The secretary's report was adopted. It showed pupils enrolled, 8,798, and in average daily attendance, 5,797.

The health report was as follows: Four cases scarlet fever and one of measles.

As acting superintendent, Mr. Leavitt reported that Sister M. Concilia had been appointed assistant teacher for Holy Trinity. There had been a great deal of illness among the teachers as well as absence for other causes. In all forty-four were absent from one-half day to one month and in a few cases classes had to be closed. He was pleased to report conditions now almost normal.

Two months' pay was granted C. MacDonald, retired janitor.

### KLAN FOR BOYS REVEALED BY MOTHER'S HUNT

Jamaica Excited by Junior Branch of Secret Order—School Heads Scoff.

New York, March 13.—Excitement over the Ku Klux Klan in Jamaica was revived and given a new turn when the mother of a student at Jamaica High School found in her son's pocket a handbill suggesting that he affiliate with the Junior branch of the Invisible Empire.

"Membership in the Junior Ku Klux Klan," is announced, "is open to all American born between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one. Further information may be had by addressing P. O. Box 383."

The name of the postoffice, the mother said, had been torn off, making it impossible to investigate through it. Authorities at Jamaica High School were inclined to believe that large quantities of the proclamation had been distributed to the boys, but refused to regard the matter seriously. Dr. W. T. Vinyan, principal of the Eastern District High School, said that even if it were found that a Junior Klan existed, the boys would treat it as a joke. At Erasmus Hall High School and Commercial High School knowledge of the Junior branch was denied.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

There was a highway robbery and a violent assault in Halifax last evening, the victim being Albert Manley, employee of the Canadian National Railway, who resides on Duncan street.

Manley left his home shortly before eight o'clock to visit some friends on College street, near the corner of Summer street. He was accompanied by two men, one of whom asked him for a cigarette, and as he was about to comply with the request the other man struck him on the head with a heavy instrument and he fell to the ground unconscious. They then went through his pockets, taking his watch and chain and a sum of money, and made off.

It was nearly two hours after he was struck down that Mr. Manley was discovered lying on the ground. He was unconscious at that time.

That part of the street is not much frequented at night, and if any person saw him there, they evidently continued on their way without giving him any assistance. Soon after he was discovered he was removed to the residence of Dr. Macellan, who on ascertaining his condition had him removed to the V. G. Hospital.

Manley was suffering from the injury to his head, and also to the long exposure. He says that he heard persons passing close to him, but he could not speak or attract their attention.

Manley thinks he was struck with a piece of lead pipe.
