GAVE CHLOROFORM TO END SUFFERINGS OF A DYING WOMAN

Shaker Colony Members Admit it and Say it Was at Her Own Request

Kissimmee, Fla., Sept. 19.—"We helped our friend out of his life at her own request. She was in the last stages of tuberculosis and she was suffering and at the best had only a few more days to live."

This was the statement given out here by Elizabeth Sears and E. B. Gillespie, members of the Shaker Colony, who recently administered chloroform to Sadie Marchant, who was dying. A coroner's inquest will be begun today.

THE SAVING TO THE CONSUMER

(Toronto Globe).
In Tuesday's Globe there was published a table showing the saving to the consumer, on the basis of last year's importations, that would result from the abolition or reduction of taxation on a number of the principal articles included in the reciprocity agreement. As there has been some misunderstanding as to the meaning of the last column of figures the table is repeated. In the last column the figures include not merely the estimated saving on importations from the United States, but from the twelve favored nations that will for a time send in dutiable goods on the same basis in respect to duty as the United States—
