'No, my marriage was not a school success, as I have sometimes seen stated. Though I did not know my husband, we never attended the same school. Our parents were friends and there was always a cordial intercourse between the young people. My engagement was not announced until after Mr. Taft had been graduated from Yale, though it had existed in a tentative fashion since we were both mere children."

"One of the pleasant memories connected with my girlhood was a visit I made to Washington during Hayes' regime. President Hayes was my father's law partner, and the greatest intimacy existed between the families. I always called the president 'uncle' and 'aunt', and my sister, Mrs. Loughlin, of Pittsburgh, was named after Mrs. Taft's mother."
