WOMAN IS WIFEHOOD,
SAYS MRS. W. H. TAFT

Higher Education Does Not
Unfit Girls for Home
Duties.

Charming Woman Who May be Mistress
of White House Domestic
in Task.

(By Margaret B. Downing.)
WASHINGTON, May 8.—"All women it is true, are not called upon to preside over a house or to rear children, but all broad-minded women admit that this is the noblest type of usefulness. Few women always called the president and his wife 'uncle' and 'aunt', and my sister, Mrs. Loughlin, of Pittsburgh, was named Lucy Webb for Mrs. Hayes.

EARLY DAYS IN WHITE HOUSE.
"My visit to Washington last during the Christmas holidays and such time as I had, it seemed the climax of human bliss for a girl of 16 to be the honored guest at the White House. I recall the many pretty little functions. As I look back, I cannot see that there is much difference in the way those occupants of the old mansion lived and the life of today. But something which stands out vividly was the dignity to a marked degree and the self-poise necessary for the successful hostess.

"Mrs. Hayes was a famous housekeeper, and her presences, calm and dignified, were something to remember. The president always presided, and he said that he enjoyed the supper better than any meal of the day.

PERSONALITY FOR BRYN MAWR.
"Higher education for women," Mrs. Taft laughed, "will my daughter has elected to take a full college course at Bryn Mawr and is now studying diligently in order to enter the college next autumn. I believe in the best and most thorough education possible for every one—men and women—and it is a source of deep gratitude that all my children are studious.

"My idea about higher education for women is that it makes them great in soul as well as in intellect. It never seemed to me that it should make them poor imitations of men. I am old-fashioned enough to think that women is the complement of man, and that what is more feminine about her, is most attractive to man, and therefore of the greatest utility to the world.

"I could never see any fundamental superiority or inferiority. The only superiority lies in the way in which the responsibilities of life are discharged. Judged by this standard some women are superior to men, and some husbands fall very much below their wives some brothers below their sisters.

"Education for women and as such as they can obtain, in my mind possesses larger advantages than the commercial one of providing a means of making when it is necessary, a good livelihood. This I do not deny is a potent advantage, but the aggregate woman the mission is to preside over a home and to fulfill the highest obligations of womanhood.

"Education which really educates heart, mind and body, gives the grace and ability and the exalted sense of duty, necessary to fill that high destiny in the home.

SMUGGLING OF ARMS TO RUSSIAN POLAND

Enormous Finds are Made in English and Scotch Cities.

Socialistic Cycle Agent Intermediary in the Shipment Across the Seas.

EDINBURGH, May 8.—It is not often that Scotland is made a centre of plots against any of its continental neighbors. The law-abiding Scot has hitherto kept himself with their headquarters on the other side of the North Sea. A secret organization, however, has just been discovered in Edinburgh the object of which has been the smuggling of weapons and ammunition into the disaffected districts of Russian Poland. The first part of the story belongs to the town of Newcastle-on-Tyne. There the attention of the police was called to the suspicious traffic going on from a house in one of the poorer districts of the city. It appeared that a Polish Jew named Keast, had sublet a room from a poor family and not allowed his landlord to go into the room on any account and he always locked the door and took the key with him when he went out.

AMMUNITION FOUND.
On the police searching the house it was found that the cases contained ammunition, including many hundreds of thousands of cartridges for Mauser rifles and pistols all fresh and in good condition. Keast, however, had got wind of the police visit and disappeared. The people in the house who had sublet him the room were able to find themselves "wedded to their" contents of the cases or about Keast.

This seizure was followed by similar "finds" at Sunderland in circumstances of a like character, and also at Glasgow. The police however, puzzled for a time to form a theory as to where the cartridges were coming from and as to what was being done with them. A discovery in Edinburgh has solved the mystery. It seems that all the winter a traffic of the kind has been going on between Hamburg and Leith. The ammunition was shipped in cases which were openly marked as containing explosives, and as the shipping bills were found in order, and the goods were consigned to a respectable firm of carting contractors, the custom authorities did not think it necessary to interfere in the matter. These carting contractors were advised from time to time by a man named Denver, to deliver the cases of ammunition to a cycle agent in Edinburgh and as their money was always forthcoming, they too, considered the transaction one of the ordinary course of trade. But after the finds of ammunition in Newcastle and Glasgow they got uneasy and gave the Edinburgh police a hint of what was going on.

CYCLE AGENTS ARRESTED.
The police set a watch over the cycle agent's shop and soon they saw delivered there a number of cases which they immediately seized and called upon the cycle agent to give an explanation of his conduct. They also detained at the same time a person who was in the shop. The cycle agent made a clean breast of the affair. He had been induced to act as an intermediary in the shipment of arms and ammunition on a commission and he also avowed that as a socialist he was in sympathy with the struggling people of Russia. He said that he did not consider that in so doing he was breaking the laws of his own country.
