TWO WORLD'S RECORDS MADE IN MONTREAL. MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—The Canadian championships held under the auspices of the Athletic Federation of Canada were held Saturday in M. A. A. grounds and drew a large crowd.

Two world's records were made in weight competitions. Ralph Rose of California set a mark for putting the ponderous ball 24 inches to the previous record and making it now 49 feet 7.4 inches.

Under the American rules they will not stand as records, not being made in competition. They will, however, stand as Canadian records were broken. In the three-mile run J. J. Daly of the Irish-Americans cut off 16 seconds, doing the distance in 15, 15, or 15 seconds under the record.

WIFE BURNS HUSBAND, THEN SHOOTS HIM DEAD.

Death Preceded by the Terrible Agonies Caused by Sulphuric Acid Bath.

PARIS, Sept. 21.—A tragic and dramatic story was unfolded today at Andre Assises, when Mme. Issasague, a young woman, was charged with the murder of her husband, Dr. Bassageac. For ten years of their wedded life the couple had lived humbly and happily together, but when they removed to another part of the district, and property began to shine upon her husband, Mme. Bassageac's attitude completely changed, and she became unreasonably jealous of him.

On July 23 last, while he was in bed, she came to the bedside and burned him slightly with a flatiron. A violent scene followed, and finally the doctor seized a revolver, whereupon Mme. Issasague rushed out of the house and returned with a quantity of sulphuric acid, which she threw at her husband, burning him severely.

In an agony of torture the victim jumped out of bed and ran down to the kitchen in search of water. Mme. Bassageac then discharged her revolver at him, and he fled to his room. His wife waited for him, revolver in hand, and when he passed in his dressing room she fired again, and her husband fell dead.

Mme. Bassageac was greatly esteemed, and no justification is said to exist to justify his wife's suspicions of infidelity.

HUNGARIAN COUNTESS ELOPES WITH PEASANT.

Now Living With Her Lover in Hut Adjoining Her Father's Estate.

VIENNA, Sept. 21.—A romantic story of the elopement of an 18-year-old Hungarian countess with a peasant seven years her senior comes from a village in Trentschin, Hungary.

The girl, who is the Countess Henrietta Konrath, daughter of Count Edward Konrath, is now living with her lover, Johann Andrasik, in a hut adjoining her father's estate.

The couple told the representative of a Budapest newspaper that they first met six years ago, when Andrasik rescued the countess from a ditch after a carriage accident.

The couple met frequently, and finally fell in love. Two years ago the countess' family discovered the attachment, and the girl was sent away to school for a time, while Andrasik went into the army.

When he completed his term of military service and returned to the village the chaste meetings between the lovers were renewed.

At last they decided to elope. Andrasik brought a ladder to the countess' residence one night, and placed it against her bedroom window. She managed to escape without alarming the household, and the couple went to Andrasik's home.

The countess' father tried to force her to return, and even sent gendarmes to Andrasik's estate, but she refused to leave her lover, and declared that she would marry him when she came of age.

Her father then wrote her a letter formally disowning her.

DEATH OF ST. JOHN MAN AT SARANAC LAKE, N.Y.

Only twenty-two years of age and married less than six weeks, Harry Elbridge Hall, son of William S. Hall, formerly of this city but now a resident of Saranac Lake, N. Y., on Saturday.

Mr. Hall was well known in St. John, having been connected with the Bank of Montreal. He afterwards spent some time in Dauphin, N. W. T. Last winter, being in failing health, he went to Saranac Lake.

His death is particularly sad. He had been engaged to marry Miss Agnes Hague of Montreal, and the marriage was performed six weeks ago. Mr. Hall was with him at the time of his death. The funeral will take place in Montreal today.

Mr. Hall was a brother of Percy O. Hall, manager of the North End branch of the Royal Bank, and another brother, Gilbert, lives at Albert. Three sisters also survive. They are Winifred in Irvington, N. Y., Avis in New York city and Muriel in Albert.
