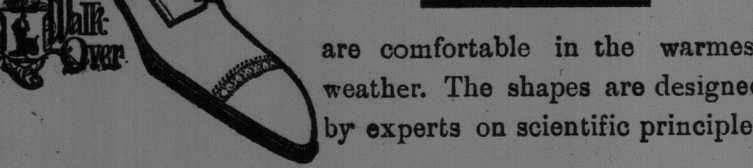

LOCAL NEWS

The Portland Street Methodist Y. M. C. A. picnic held yesterday at Water's Landing was well attended. The usual games, sports and base ball matches were carried out.

Information has been laid before Justice Mason against Hugh J. McCormack, E. A. Trudewill, Chas. Maxwell, Mrs. Stanley Barker, for selling liquor during prohibited hours.

The judges in the race held at Westfield on Saturday, July 4th, 1938, for class "A" prize, and Magee trophy have decided that the "Chinook" is disqualified for fouling the buoy off River Bank. Winners are: "Wabeno" 1st, "Mona" 2nd, "Atrah Wanne" 3rd.

Mr. McDonald, the new superintendent of the Boys' Industrial Home, has arrived in the city, and will assume charge of the institution today. There will be a meeting of the Board of Governors of the Home this afternoon. It is likely that they will discuss the appointment of a new guard and a new teacher for the institution. It has been suggested that a teacher be secured who could instruct the boys in manual training as well as the other lines of school work.

HARBOR COMMISSION

FURTHER POSTPONED
Dr. Pugsley Wires That Bill Will Not be Considered at This Session—House to Prorogue on the 10th.

The following wire was received by Mayor Bullock this morning from Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works:

"Harbor commission bill received yesterday. Prime Minister says too late to consider this session as prorogation is hoped for week from Saturday."

This will mean a serious setback to the harbor commission scheme, as it was hoped that the bill would be put through at this session.

With the postponement of the commission the aldermen will be forced to deal with govern. matters which have been hanging fire until this was on a more settled basis.

The port has been without a harbor master for some time and it is now probable that the city will be forced to deal with this matter and make some more permanent arrangement than that now in force of allowing the wharfage collector to fill both offices.

Steps will have to be taken, any way, commission or otherwise, to arrange for a grain conveyor to the new west side docks. The question of whether the water supply, which is not in one that the city will have to deal with promptly.

The friends of the Navy Island bridge project will not view with favor the postponement of the consideration of the scheme until the commission, which is to be given power to build the bridge, is brought into existence.

SAWDUST IN PIPES MAKES HILYARD'S MILL SHUT DOWN

Hilyard's Mill at Strait Shore was forced to close down this morning owing to the failure of the water supply. The fire was drawn and the men laid off for the day.

This afternoon it was discovered that the trouble was due to a quantity of sawdust in the water pipe which had completely plugged the water screen known as an ell trap in front of the water meter. This is supposed to be due to the saw dust by the water department in repairing leaks. The sawdust was cleaned out and the mill is expected to start work again in the morning.

PANIC WHEN LAMP WAS KNOCKED OFF TABLE

Herolism of Miss Lou Sime Prevented a Tragedy

Audience in W. C. T. U. Hall Thrown into a Panic—One Woman Prostrated From the Excitement.

Full particulars of the lamp incident in Fairville W. C. T. U. rooms last evening go to show that the affair was far more serious than at first stated, and add to the credit due Miss Lou Sime for her courage in averting what might have been a serious catastrophe.

Some hundreds of people had gathered for the entertainment. Upon the conclusion of the programme and before the refreshments were brought on, some of the children were playing about the room. Two little girls, Lulu Matthews and Sadie Stevens were having a game of chess, when the latter bumped against a table upon which a lamp had been placed. The lamp was knocked to the floor and flamed up. In an instant panic reigned. Men, women and children screamed, rushed for the exits, and generally lost their heads. Some managed to get out the door and several men headed for the nearest fire alarm. In the hall there was the greatest excitement, and for a few moments things looked very serious, not from the fire, but from the panic. Miss Sime, who is seventeen or eighteen years of age, was apparently the only one to keep her head. She ran to the blazing lamp, and holding it at arms' length, carried it to the front door, throwing it on the street. This was done so quickly that all danger was over before the men who had started for the fire box were able to send in an alarm. The excitement soon passed, and refreshments were served according to programme. No one was hurt in the mix-up, but Mrs. Matthews, one of the ladies present, was affected so that she became quite ill during the night and required the services of a physician.
