COPE AGAIN CHOSEN

BY LIBERALS AT DIOGY

DIOGY, N. S., Sept. 7.—At an en-
thusiastic convention held at the
court house here today Albert J. S.
Cope, M. P., was unanimously chosen
to contest in the forthcoming election
with every single polling booth repre-
sented and with but one name brought
forward, and received the great
strength of the party of this riding
was most apparent. Mr. Cope
accepted the nomination and the
election in a stirring speech amid much
applause. Upon rising to speak he was

diate destinies of the country. Mr. Cope
ended his speech by saying that he
in a few weeks to actively engage in
the campaign.

ing of the wire with great force, sustaining in-

now in the hospital.

UNDESIRABLES ARE

BEING TURNED BACK

BY THE HUNDREDS

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 7.—The sys-
tem of rigid inspection established by
the immigration department this sum-
mer along the international boundary
has resulted in the turning back of
hundreds of undesirable from the
United States and Canada. The
immigration department sought to
prevent the entry of undesirable
persons and would have added to con-
gressional labor market during the
coming winter. During the month
of August no less than 186 people were
detained from entering Canada for the
aggravated reasons. Practically all of
those were out of work and possessed
of no funds, and if allowed to enter
the United States authorities from
aggravated reasons would have
immigration department sought to
prevent them.

Minnie, Lydia, Berrie and Andrew
Joseph. Joseph is a Massachussetts
Gordon in Edmonton, Norman in Re-
gina. Mr. Edgar is also survived by
three sisters and a brother. The
funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon
at 3.30 from house, Rev. George Wood
will officiate.

CHINAMEN ESCAPED;

CAPTAIN PAID UP

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 7.—
The Elder Dempster steamer Sokoto
arrived here on Thursday night
and had on board 25 Chinamen con-
signed to Mexican ports. Saturday 20
of the number were found to be mis-
ing and on investigation it was found
two of the gang escaped the vigilant
eye of the watchman and had landed.
All efforts to locate them so far have
failed. The captain of the steamer
has deposited at the Customs here
\$1,000 as head money to cover head tax
should they not be recaptured. The
steamer sailed Saturday.

REPRESENTS GREAT BRITAIN

MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—The repre-
sentative of Great Britain to the Inter-
national conference on tuberculosis to
be held in Washington shortly, J. P.
Atten McDougall, C. M. G., was in the
city yesterday, having arrived on the

the appointee of the British Board
of Trade at the conference and left for
Washington tonight.
