EMMERSON WON CLEAN ELECTION

MONCTON, Feb. 18.—That the Dominion election in Westmorland county was "clean" is the finding of the Westmorland County Electoral Reform League in their annual report issued today. The report reviews at length the methods undertaken to secure a clean election in this county during the campaign in October last, including the employment of private detectives. These detectives, the report says, were in the field over a fortnight, spending most of their time in the principal centres of population. Their report fails to give information that there were any serious violations of the law, but the feeling seemed to prevail that the election was to be run "clean," and the reports from the private committees appointed to watch the polling booths indicate that the election was cleanly conducted. Apart from a report that treating went on in one booth and meals were given at another, the election laws were observed. The report also refers to vague charges of corruption which have been put forward since the election, and believes that these should either be made good or withdrawn. The report also states that representation is being made to the provincial government for a revision of the election law which will render it a useful instrument for the suppression of bribery covering municipal elections also.
