

FOUR HUNDRED MOORS KILLED IN FIERCE BATTLE WITH THE SPANISH FORCES

Retreat, and, Suddenly ADDRESSES TO Turning, Poured Volley After Volley into the IN THE LOWELL-GRAY CASE Crowded Ranks of the Pursuing Tribesmen

MADRID, Sept. 22—The Spanish forces in Morocco, according to the latest despatches received here were eminently successful Sept. 20 and Sept. 21 in attaining their offensive object, the turning of Mount Gurugua, and the surrounding of the feroclous Benlisicar tribesmen.

The Government is today publishing broadcast accounts of many gallant deeds and war fever is at high pitch.

Near Taxdir four battalions of Spanish troops were deployed over a front six miles long. They were charged suddenly by two hundred Arab horsemen. General Tovar, perceiving that the enemy threatened to break the line, sent out a strong detachment of the surange and cavalrymen to check them. The two parties encountered each other with a terrific shock. At first the Moors broke, but they returned to the attack several times before they were finally dispersed leaving many dead on the field.
