CONFESSED

Boston, Mass., April 19.—Chester 3. Jordan, of Somerville, who has been in jail since last September when he was arrested and confessed that he killed his wife and cut her body to pieces, hoping to hide the crime, will be placed on trial to-mor low in the Superior Court of Middle sex county. It is believed that the lefence will base its case on a plea of temporary insanity. Jordan, who is a young man of about 30 years of age, is a brother-in-law of Jesse R Livermore, the New York cotton speculator, and it is understood that the Livermore millions will be used freely in an effort to keep Jordan from going to the electric chair. Three of the ablest criminal law yers of Massachusetts have been engaged to conduct the defence.

The killing of Mrs. Jordan last September attracted widespread at tention, owing to the circumstances surrounding the discovery of the rime and the arrest of the young Jusband. The murder was one of the most gruesome with which the Boston police ever had to deal. The victim, Honorah Jordan, was an actress aged 23 years, Jordan killed the wooman in their home in Somerville.
