BROKEN RAIL CAUSES ACCIDENT TO TRAIN ON SALISBURY BRANCH

Albert, Feb. 18.—The funeral of the late Klinebar Wilbur took place yesterday. The interment was made in the Waterdale Cemetery, in the Parish of Harvey. The services were conducted by the Rev. T. B. Wetmore, pastor of the Alma-Waterdale church. Mr. Wilbur was a brother of Mrs. Huntley, who lives at Mr. Barbour's home here.

There is prospects of a very early opening of navigation. The Shepody River is practically clear of ice for a long distance and no heavy ice seems to be made out in the bay.

The Albert train got off the track on the upward trip this morning when within a mile of Salisbury a broken rail was the cause. The damage was not serious, and the train was only about an hour late on the return.

Captain Robert White, the Harvey mail driver, is ill and his son, Ezra White, is in charge of the mail service temporarily.

The post office at Albert will be moved on the first day of March to the building formerly occupied as a drug store, first door north of the telephone office.

Trueman Douthright was seriously injured this morning by a fall on the ice, near his residence, his head was painfully injured.

NOVEL INTERESTING PROGRAM AT THE UNIQUE.
