A Reply from Mr. Fawcett.

To the Editor of The Telegraph:

Sir: I received your letter of March 11, in regard to a complaint of the Cross Fertilizer Company, of a report which appeared in The Daily Telegraph of an address given by myself on Commercial Fertilizers at the Farmers and Dairymen's meeting at Fredericton. The manager of the Cross company refers to my statement that Sydney slag could be landed at Saskville in car lots at \$11 per ton and says the statement is absolutely without foundation and that farmers should not be mislead by such reports. For the benefit of the manager of the Cross company and the farmers of the maritime provinces I will now give my reasons for making that teatement and your readers can judge whether the farmers should be warned against me or against somebody else. At the Farmers and Dairymans convention of 1912, Mr. R. G. Murray, of St. John, brought before that meeting a resolution requesting the New Brunswick government to investigate the question of commercial fertilizers and to take such means as are necessary to protect the farmers from the extortion of the fertilizer companies. Believing Mr. Murray was on the right track, I decided to look into the matter, and if possible, to help devise means to aid the farmers in their struggle for emancipation from the unjust trade conditions of the present. From personal interviews and correspondence, now on hand, we obtained the information from parties using Sydney slag that "A" quality of slag was quoted in car lots at Halifax at \$11, and supposed it could be landed at Sackville at the same price, as it was shipped from Sydney by rail and the freight charges would be practically the same to Sackville as to Halifax.

After the meeting at Fredericton I interviewed a traveller for the Cross company, who stated to me that his selling price was \$11.50 at Halifax and the same
