For the first time in many years the Drama Society is using Memorial Hall for a major production. This is not because we feel that the facilities in the Hall are good enough for the production of a play, but because the exodus to Mem. Hall was a necessity.

In previous years the society used either the Teachers College or High School stages downtown. But over the summer the governing bodies of these institutions raised the price of rental by almost one hundred percent. This meant that the club was quite unable to afford the rent on a

This state of affairs forced the society to look elsewhere for a stage on which to produce its two scheduled plays this year. The only possible alternative to the theatres downtown was Memorial Hall: It seemed, at first, that to produce a play on the stage was going to be very difficult. But the stage crew, under Bill Polock, worked hard and the technical monstrosities were soon overcome. The director and actors have worked equally hard and they too quickly overcame any difficulties which confronted them.
