May I offer my best of wishes on your return to Canada.

The general opinion of every one seems to have been fairly well summed up by Bishop in his column of Saturday in which he said that no one but the most violent partisan would question the enhancement of your personal prestige. He added that "it was high when he went away. Most people will think it higher when he comes back".

Car 100 will be ready at Quebec, and will bring you to a most hearty welcome at Ottawa. Your Ministers will be on hand, with the possible exception of Mr. Michaud, who has an engagement for the 10th, but will be here on Monday. I understand all the others will be here on that date too in anticipation of any meeting you may wish to call.

Miss Zavitske is sending you a letter giving you McLeod's news about Kingsmere. I understand everything is in good order.

Your telegraphic request for clippings dealing with the opening of the Paris Pavilion has been complied with.
