Sir,-

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At the request of Indian Agent J. R. Brown, I accompanied him to the Westbank reserve on the west shore of Okanagan Lake to confer with him on some water difficulties that have arisen there, in which the Indians on that reserve are interested.

A stream named McDougall Creek runs through the reserve, and on it a water record was obtained by a white man away back in 1875, or thirteen years before that particular reservation was allotted by Commissioner OcReilly. The land for which the record was obtained as well as the record itself is now in possession of a whiteman named e D. Gulletly.

There is a spring that has its rise some distance from McDougall Creek on its right bank and it discharges into McDougall Creek about 125 yards from the point where Archives of Canada ationales du Canada
