## IS QUEEN ALIVE?

ical Scene at the Court of Servia.

Vienna, Nov. 20. - An unconfirmed eport reached Vienna that Queen Draga has been shot in the streets of Belgrade. The Neue Frie Presse and other Vienna papers publish various rumors, one declaring that the Servian Queen was assassinated, another that she was wounded and a third that she committed suicide. Reports from other sources deny the statement that Queen Draga was killed and assert that the rumor of her death was caused by an hysterical scene with

King Alexander. There is no reliable information on the subject here, but it is generally believed that a serious crisis exists in

Paris, Nov. 21.-According to a despatch from Vienna to The Echo de Paris, an attempt has been made to assassinate the Queen of Servia, three shots having been fired at her while she was driving near Somlin. A despatch to the same paper from Belgrade gives a rumor that the Queen attempted suicide at Somlin.

### SHOOTING AFFRAY

Dr. Harbottle Tries to Kill Herman Stewart-Bad Feeling the Cause.

Brantford, Nov. 20 .- Shortly before noon to-day Herman Stewart, of Burford, was shot in the head by Dr. Robt Harbottle, of the same place.

It is not expected that the wound will prove fatal. The bullet entered the head over the temple and passed between the scalp and the skull, com-

ing out at the back of the ear.
The shot was fired from a distance of one foot from Mr. Stewart's head and how it did not kill him was a Providential act, exciting the amazement of all who were present.

The shooting has caused the most intense excitement in the village and

neighborhood, and from the moment of the shooting until the arrest and removal of the doctor an angry and threatening crowd surrounded his Dr. Harbottle deliberately pulled the revolver from his pocket when he was standing only a foot from Stewart,

and, pointing the weapon at Stewart's head, pulled the trigger. bullet entered Stewart's head at the temple and passed out just behind and slightly above the ear. Although the victim bled profusely, the wound is not at all dangerous, and he will recover without a doubt bullet did not enter the scalp, but glanced off.
