MANUAL TRAINING.

A question of exceedingly vital importance will come up before the trustees of the Collegiate Institute this afternoon.

Every seat in the school is filled at the present time. This summer two classes of entrance pupils from the Central school, one from the Mc-Keough school and one from the Separate school, besides the number which always come from the country.

Reough school and one from the Separate school, besides the number which always come from the country, will come up for examination. That means that the C. C. I., after the summer holidays, will be very much crowded and extra room must be provided immediately.

The question which is now staring the trustees in the face is how shall this extra room be secured and what work shall an additional teacher do.

"The suggestion has been made, and I think it a proper one," said Trustee Thornton this morning, "that manual training be introduced in the school. There are arguments to be advanced both for and against it, but I think it would be a wise and progressive move on the part of the trustees to introduce this special line of modern education into the High school.

"Apart from all of the arguments which have been advanced in Lavor "Apart from all of the arguments which have been advanced in favor of manual training, there is one which appeals to me very strongly. That is, it would add dignity to labor. The young men of to-day are trying to get away from labor with the result that in many-cases men are entering professions when they should be mechanics. The outcome of manual training in the schools would be that we would get a more intelligent class of men into the trades, which is a very desirable end to have in view."
