The people are sober and industrious; they may not need our aid long; and it may be that they are plunged into the fiery furnace of poverty and persecution now in order to strengthen their faith and expand their sympathies, and afford us an opportunity to illustrate our faith by works of charity and mercy.

Obituary Notice.

The subject of the following notice was born in Harbour Grace, Newfoundland, on the 25th Oct., 1787. Her father Mr. Pe ter Saunders, was a native of Bristol, England. Her mother was among the fruits of labours of the Rev. Wm. Black on his first visit to that place.
