The neck is trimmed with a handsome pointed collar and sharp revers which can be buttoned over. The cut of the sleeve is unique at the lower edge, where two styles may be used. The belt should match the revers, at least in color, even if of kid or silk.

The coat pattern, No. 6224, is cut in sizes 34 to 42 inches bust measure. Medium size requires 2 1/2 yards of 36 inch material, or, with a seam, 2 3/4 yards of 36 inch goods, 3/4 yard of 27 inch contrasting goods.

desire of the ratepayers in the adjoining portion of the Township, should await the expression of such desire from time to time, and that upon any application for extending sections, the question to be considered is whether the advantages of such extension are sufficient to offset the additional financial burden which the city shall be obliged to assume.

Your committee would be able to give an answer to these questions upon each concrete case put before them.

In addition to the report of the committee, City Engineer Jones, who was its chairman, presented a supplementary report or statement comparing the population and acreage of Brantford with that of other leading Canadian cities. It follows:

**A Big Estate.**  
TORONTO, July 8.—An estate of \$1,164,000 is disposed of by the will of Wilmer Hawke, vice-president of the O'Keefe Brewery Company, limited, who died early in June, which was filed for probate to-day. Of the Brewery stock and \$100,000 in bonds the same company, while the balance is made up of real estate and small allotments of stocks. His home on Oriole road is given a valuation of \$30,000. Mr. Hawke carried \$20,000 in life insurance, but most of this had been taken up in loans and the net value of the estate of this asset is about \$8,800.

**A Sad Drowning.**  
KINGSTON, Ont., July 8.—The fifth drowning in three weeks occurred here early this morning, when Hazel Johnson, aged 12, returning home with a little brother from Barriefield, after driving cows to pasture, fell off Howard's wharf. The brother girl was pulled out, but attempts at resuscitation failed. The city council last evening decided to take action with regard to having life appliances placed on all steamboat landings along the harbor front.

**Acclamation**  
PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, Man., July 8.—Hon. Arthur Meighen will be returned by acclamation, the Liberals have decided not to contest the seat.

## COUNCILLORS HAD BUSY DAY

Brantford Township Council Conducts Considerable Business.

At the afternoon session of the Township Council yesterday, considerable business was disposed of. The council dealt with communications, passed a by-law providing for the expenditures for the current year, Township Clerk Smith read a report of the statistics from the assessor's rolls, and Mr. George Thompson was awarded several contracts.

**Communications**  
A communication was received from Mr. Douglas Davidson, secretary of the Hospital for Sick Children, notifying the council that they will be liable at the rate of \$1 per day for the maintenance of a child sent from the Township. The request will be complied with.

County Clerk A. E. Watts wrote the council advising that the Township's share for county purposes for the current year is \$7,423.

City Clerk Leonard wrote advising the council that the city council have approved of the plan submitted by the Township Council for the work to be done on West street to Mr. Hope cemetery.

Brewster & Heyd wrote the council on behalf of Mr. Norman S. Maynard asking \$100 damages for injuries received by a horse belonging to him, while on the highway between the Township and the Township of Tuscarora. The matter was referred to the Township Solicitor.

**By-Law Passed**  
A by-law was passed providing for the expenditure of the Township for the current year, which amounts to \$36,367.74. The assessment rate was struck at 7 mills on the dollar. The following are the estimated expenditures for 1913:
