





Modish One Piece Coat. This is decidedly the favorite model for coats at present. The only seam is under the arm and on the under side of the sleeve. The neck is trimmed with a handsome pointed collar and sharp reers which can be buttoned over. The cut of the sleeve is unique at the lower edge, where two styles may be used. The belt should match the revers, at least in color, even if of kid or silk.
