## THE PROBS

Toronto, Jan. 21.—A moderate disturbance is centered over Nebraska, while a cold wave appears to be spreading into the western provinces from the northward. The weather has been milder from the Great Lakes eastward with local rain in Eastern Ontario and light snow in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

## A Fine Showing.

The outstanding feature of the 84th annual report of the Bank of Nova Scotia appearing elsewhere in this issue, is its exceptional strength, which in the circumstances prevailing to-day should cause considerable satisfaction not only to shareholders and depositors of this institution but to the public generally; for it is a matter of vital importance to the country that the banks should emerge from the present trying conditions in a satisfactory manner.

The steady growth of the Bank of Nova Scotia is evidenced by the increase in total assets from \$95,733,670 to \$104,244,467 during the year, while net profits for the year ending, Dec. 31st, 1915, were \$1,220,057, as compared with \$1,196,116 for the previous year. Cash alone exclusive of the deposits in the Central Gold Reserves, amounted to 20 per cent. of the liabilities to the public, while immediately available assets have reached a total of \$59,990,461—an exceedingly strong position.

About two hundred thousand gipsies wander about Hungary and are regarded as a dangerous community. So notorious are their thieving propensities that they are not allowed inside the towns, while the villages tolerate them for only two days.

The health service, particularly the interior and zoological branches, is also found wanting, as is the economic branch. M. Jeanneney concludes by saying that it would be criminal to remain silent on what can bring victory most prompt, less costly and more brilliant.

The intelligence, good faith and probity of the officials is not questioned in the report, which characterizes as "grave" some faults of the business management of the army, and says that red tape is just as heavy to-day and the union between the diverse services no better secured, the under secretary system being criticized in this connection.

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
