TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS IN SESSION AT OTTAWA

Yesterday's Session Given Over to Transaction of Routine Business, and Discussion of Various Resolutions

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—The morning session of the thirty-third annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada was devoted principally to the adoption and discussion of various resolutions. The announcement was made that J. P. Williams, who last year represented the English labor men at the convention had died. The delegates unanimously passed a vote of sympathy.

Following this business the resolution was proposed that there should be a special committee appointed for the purpose of reporting to the Labor Congress on the important questions of separation allowances, patriotic fund matters, pensions, soldiers pay, demobilization, etc., was taken up before the convention.

"I do not see why the convention should waste its time in taking up such a question," was the remark of Delegate Kerrigan. "The labor movement cannot take up the cudgels for the soldiers and assume soldiers interests when these soldiers or most of them, are connected as members with organized labor. Any attempt to take up this matter would be absurd. Is it not a fact that war veterans and returned men are being driven into our factories and workshops so that our wages may be reduced?"

Delegate Stevenson: "Such remarks are a direct insult to the principles of organized labor. I do not know how any man can openly make such statements before this congress which is representative of labor in its highest form. Are not the 25,000 men that are fighting now at the front, and are from our ranks as good as we are and entitled to the same privileges and protection? Should we not give them our fullest support?"

Delegate Cassidy, of Montreal, who has furnished the fire works so far at the convention, then sprang to his feet and created somewhat of a commotion by saying that he had not previously insulted the American Federation of Labor it was due to an oversight. He would see to it that this oversight was rectified later. "I oppose the resolution strongly," stated Mr. Cassidy "for I know that in Montreal, union men who are in uniform have been called upon and urged to keep up the fight for the bosses. When a man joins the army and dons khaki he automatically cuts himself off from organized labor and is fighting for something entirely different."

Finally the resolution was handed over to the committee on pensions. Delegate Sullivan of Hamilton was appointed a member of this committee. A resolution that the congress place itself on record in being in favor of uniform laws for all processes of manufacturing employing the use of abrasive particularly in Ontario was adopted on the motion of D. H. Wright of the Metal Polishers, Buffers and Brass Workers international union. The necessity of appointing practical men as blowers inspectors will be recommended to the provincial authorities by the congress. The postmen have a resolution to look after their interest; to wit, that the postmaster-general be urged to extend the Saturday half holiday. This resolution was proposed by the Federated Association of Letter Carriers.
