Fifty-five Presbyterians from various

Seminary; Rev. W. H. Barracough,
of Moncton; Rev. J. C. Robbins, of
Boston; Rev. H. H. Irish, of West
China; Rev. H. C. Priest, of Toronto;
Rev. G. Irving, of New York; Rev. C.
A. Myers of Toronto; Rev. R. E. Gul-
lison, of South India, and Miss Winn-
fred Thomas, eastern student secretary
Y. W. C. A. The conference was re-

garded by those who attended as suc-
cessful from every point of view, and it
was felt that this annual gathering
only needs to be better known in all
the churches of the maritime provinces
to make it a veritable mecca for in-
terested workers and learners in Chris-
tian missions.—From Presbyterian

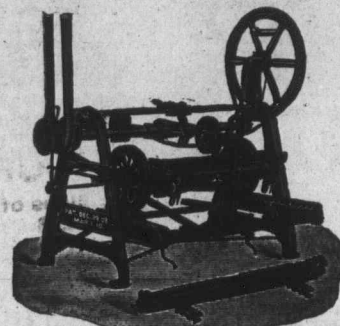
