## MADE A HIT

Miss Eida Idle and her Coterie  
of Maple City Vocalists as-  
tonish Eastern Audience

The Chatham vocalists have taken the city of Wilmington, Del., by storm. The following is taken from the account in The Morning News of a concert recently given by Miss Idle in the eastern city.

Grace Methodist Episcopal Sunday school hall was filled with music lovers last night, when the introductory concert of Miss Eida Idle, director of the choir of Grace Church, was given. Miss Idle was assisted by Miss Allie Humphrey, soprano; Frank H. Mason, basso; Robert Knight, tenor; LaMert Guyer, soprano; W. E. Douglas, alto; and Miss Martha Bradford, accompanist, and Grace Sunday school orchestra, under the direction of John D. Taylor.

It was the initial bow of Miss Idle in concert selections to Wilmingtonians, and in the audience were men and women at the fore in matters musical in this city. The reputation of Miss Idle had preceded her, and she fully sustained the high standard that naturally was expected of her. Her enunciation was very clear, her voice powerful, and her expression and interpretation were all that could be desired of an artist such as she.

Miss Idle made a very favorable impression, and her selection were classed among the best ever heard in this city. Miss Idle's introductory solos were "Staccato Polka," by Mulder; "Sing, Sweet Bird," by Ganz, and they were so pleasingly given that Miss Idle had to respond to encores after the applause had subsided.

Miss Allie Humphrey, of Grace choir, a pupil of Miss Idle, gave evidence of great ability in her rendition of "For All Eternity" by Marchioni. Miss Humphrey has a rich soprano voice, of which she has excellent control. Robert Knight, also a member of Grace choir, contributed to the program by Adams, which gave him ample opportunity to win the encomiums of his hearers.

## SAD DEATH

A very sad death occurred in the city this morning when Margaret Gordon, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Everett, of this city, passed peacefully away at her father's home, Hyslop street. Deceased has been ill for only a short time and her death, while not entirely unexpected, has come as a sad blow to her parents and her bereaved husband who survive her.

After her marriage to Chas. Gordon, deceased resided in Sturgis, Mich. About nine weeks ago she was taken seriously ill and removed to Detroit, where she underwent operation. The operation, however, gave her but little relief and she was almost immediately removed to her home in this city, where everything possible was done to relieve her suffering. A few weeks ago she was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for another operation, but it was found that she was not physically strong enough to withstand the shock of a second operation and she was taken back to her father's home, where she died.

During all of her illness deceased has borne herself with Christian fortitude and patience, and when the last summons came she was entirely prepared to go. She was deeply beloved by all with whom she came in personal contact, and her death is deeply regretted by her many friends and acquaintances. The family have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.

Deceased was 36 years of age and has been married but a few years, and her husband is prostrated with grief.

The funeral will take place to-morrow at 2:30 o'clock from the residence of her father, Hyslop street, to the William street Baptist church, and thence to the Maple Leaf cemetery.
