

Berkeley Smith, for twenty-seven years the capable Bursar of the University of Toronto, and for fifty years a ser-vant of the university, died suddenly at his office desk yesterday morning at about 10.30. He had just arrived at his office in the university, and was going over his mail, when, without warning, he lurched forward in his chair, falling over his desk. His assistant, Mr. F. A. Moure, immediassistant, Mr. F. A. Moure, immediately ran to his side and sent for medical aid. Dr. Silverthorne, who happened to be in the buildings, arrived within ten minutes, but Mr. Smith was already dead. For some time he had suffered from angina pectoris. He was 70 years of age, and the news of his death was received with great regret by the officials and students of the university.
