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MUSICAL

THE GALLOWAY PIANO RECITAL.

For some time the music lovers of our city have looked forward with pleasurable anticipations to Mr. Jas. Galloway's piano recital, and judging from the hearty applause and words of commendation from the audience that filled Christ Church Hall last evening, Mr. Galloway fully demonstrated his ability as a piano virtuoso of the first rank. His playing is characterized by extreme delicacy of touch, refined phrasing and most artistic tone-shading in the soft passages, while the forte passages were given with vigor and abandon and, moreover, with a sustained volume of tone as is rarely met with. The magnificent Grand piano by Heintzman & Company was taxed to its capacity, but afforded a most proper vehicle for Mr. Galloway's heroic efforts.

The long and varied program was received with every mark of approbation. Miss May Peate, contralto; Mr. E. T. Jones, violinist, and Mr. G. F. Moss, baritone, contributed in a marked degree to the success of the entertainment, and shared the honors with Mr. Galloway.

In the movement from the Sonata Pathétique, probably the finest Bach ever wrote, from the first grand chord in C minor, to the climax of the Allegro, Mr. Galloway demonstrated his wonderful mastery of the instrument. His interpretation was bold and at the same time according to the accepted traditions and his execution most brilliant. By request he added the Andante from the same number and was forced to respond to an encore.

Miss May Peate has a beautiful contralto voice of great flexibility and exquisite quality and fully demonstrated her ability to use it in an artistic manner in Carlo Roma's beautiful little song "A Little While."

The next number, Svendsen's Rhapsody in G, has never been given in Chatham before, when Svendsen, one of the greatest of modern composers, wrote this beautiful and exceedingly difficult romance he excelled himself. Mr. Jones as the soloist did this number full justice and gave an excellent interpretation. He responded to an encore with Schumann's beautiful little tone-picture "Abendlied."

In the fourth number Mr. Galloway showed his ability as a composer—in a smata movement composed by himself in a most delightful theme received most artistic treatment.

Mr. Moss showed a baritone voice of pleasing quality in his rendition of Robyn's beautiful little ballad "Answer."

The sixth number, "Love's Coronation," by Miss May Peate, is deserving of special mention. Miss Peate excelled herself in this grand song of Florence Aylward's. Her rendition showed evidence of most careful training and was a decided tribute to Miss Peate's ability as a cultured vocalist. She responded to an encore with a little gem of Guy D'Hardelot's, "I Hid My Love."

The group of piano solos, comprising the seventh number, is deserving of special mention—

(a) Rachmininoff's prelude in C sharp minor, in which the theme of three notes receives wonderful treatment at the hands of the composer, was beautifully rendered.

(b) Mr. Galloway excelled himself in Mendelssohn's beautiful "Andante" and Rondo Capriccioso. In this number the technical difficulties usually preclude its performance in public except by artists of unusual ability, but Mr. Galloway apparently revels in difficulties of this kind and gave this number with a fire and spirit that called for hearty applause.

(c) The Liszt arrangement of Schumann's beautiful "Love Song" was beautifully rendered, the exquisite cadenza being played with a fairy-like grace.

(d) Moszkowski's "Etincelles" is deserving of mention, although rarely played, the soloist was forced to respond to an encore.

The eighth number was the "Andante" from Wieniawski's second violin concert, and in this Mr. Jones demonstrated his ability as a violinist. This piece gives ample scope for the display of pure intonation and singing quality of tone and the soloist did this number and responded to a hearty encore with Jenner's beautiful "Romance Poétique."

Mr. Moss rendered Tchaikovsky's songs, "A Plaiding" and "Don Juan's Serenade" in good style. Special mention might be made of the accompanist to the second number.

The concluding number, Chopin's "Polonaise in E flat," was Mr. Galloway's culminating effort. In this number the technical difficulties are tremendous, but the soloist apparently made light of them and gave this number with great brilliancy, and was forced to respond to an encore.

Mrs. Milton Bogart was down for two numbers, but owing to illness was unable to appear, much to the regret of the audience.

Miss Peate very kindly consented to sing on very short notice, that her singing was fully appreciated goes without saying.

Mr. Galloway played the accompanists throughout the evening in his usual masterful way, and he and his assistants are worthy of every credit. Chatham is to be congratulated on the acquisition of Mr. Galloway to local musical circles, and it is to be hoped that he will again favor us at an early date.
