Dear S:r.—About a year ago I published a series of letters in your valuable paper, serting forth the advantages offered to bright, energetic young men and women, along the line of Shorthand and Business training. ing. These letters had the effect of sending us a few more young men for out Shorthand Department last session than we usually have, but still the number that acted on our sugggestion was so far short of the number required, that with your kind permission, I shall again bring the matter before your readers by giving a few facts regarding last year's students.

when we tell you that in the line of male stenographers, we could have filled ten times as many positions as we dd, had we had the young men with us, and qualified, when these openings occurred, it will show you how great a demand there is for this class of help.

than ever, and so urgent were many of these calls, that many young men were sent out to fill vacancies, who were still far short of the graduating

point.

When I say, that, for the reason just mentioned, we were not able to hold a single male student for graduation during the whole year, it will give you a Turther idea of how strong the demand is.

The last four positions we have just filled were worth \$700, and the position filled previous to these four

position filled previous to these four was worth \$600 per annum, and not one of these filled by a city young The outsiders are securing the

The outsiders are securing the plums. The city young men seem to prefer some course of training that they can get for nothing, or nearly so, and spend three or four years in the getting of it, and then perhaps not be able to command more than \$5 or \$6 per week when they get through. Why they follow such a course, is more than I can tell; yet they do. It is \*\*rtainly a "penny wise and a pound foolish" policy, but they must be the judges.
