GREAT GETTER OF COLLECTIONS

Spontaneous Tribute to this G. H. J. as an Advertising medium by Visting Evangelist.

At a Word From this Paper Every-body Shells Into the Collection Plate and Funds are Boosted—Our Fallings Duly Noted.

Several friends of The Planet mentioned the fact that Mr. McHardy, the evangelist, had referred to this G. H. J. in the course of his remarks yesterday morning in the Victoria Ave. Methodist Church. It has never been the intention to injure the business of Mr. McHardy or any other evangelist in so far as it was legitimate. He has a perfect right to his views and his work; and it is to be hoped that he is accomplishing all the good that he says he is. Yesterday, in the course of his remarks, Mr. McHardy complained that this journal had misrepresented him and he expressed a wish that a reporter of The Planet was present to take down his remarks.

Unfortunately, no one was present, but a representative of the paper, which Mr. McHardy chose to class as a "yellow journal," called on him today so that he might have an opportunity of repeating for publication what he wished a reporter had been present to take down.

"A man can't give verbatim what he has said when he doesn't use notes," responded Mr. McHardy, who is an approachable and pleasant man to meet.

"You attacked me by saying that my motives were mercenary. That applies to every preacher in the city. Why don't you tackle them? You haven't got the moral courage to do it. Your low slurs of a mercenary motive against an evangelist are bad policy and the law won't uphold you. You're not standing up for the morals of the community. You'll put in the report of a dog fight, or of the theatre, and you'll patronize the bummy whiskey element."

"I condemned neither the children who took part in Pinero's 'not their parents,'" continued Mr. McHardy, "but the institution of the theatre. It is the institution that is bad. I don't condemn the man who drinks whiskey, but the saloon. That is the institution. Some of the parents didn't know the nature of the production till I had condemned it, and as a result they didn't send their children the second night to take part."

"It wasn't the misquoting of me that I found fault with because the people have rallied around me and the collections have been better since. But the trouble is that thoughtless young people will read the article in The Planet and believe it and believe in the power to reach them will be lessened."

"The report in the paper stated that some of the parents were angry at my remarks. If the report be truthful, I am surprised that they did not give a man credit for seeing to it that he protected the children from the evil influence. Some whose children took part wouldn't permit them to go on account of my remarks."

"You say that my motives are mercenary and then flatly contradict it by saying that I make people mad. How can I get money from people I have made mad? I have been offered more money to take a church than I have ever received from any other source. The Lord has given a guarantee to all who preach the gospel and I'm not afraid that he will break His promise."

Mr. McHardy closed the interview with the following threat, "Be careful what you say or I'll get after you to-night. If I load the cannon up to the muzzle I'll load it."
