Montreal, Jan. 4.—One life lost and property to the extent of more than \$700,000 destroyed was the result of a fire here yesterday.

The dead man is Hormidas Gagnon, who was crushed in his own home by a falling wall when trying to rescue his son, who escaped without injury. Mistiken Co., \$10,000; Cheseborough Manufacturing Co., \$60,000; Otis Tenson Co., \$50,000; Smith Patterson Co., \$50,000; Graham Co., \$40,000; Gillette Safety Razor Co., \$35,000; Stewart McDonald, \$10,000; Woodburn Sons Co., \$30,000; Thos. C. Doyle, \$2,000; Montreal Cotton Co., \$2,000; Allan Duplicating Co., \$3,000; Telson Co., \$15,000; Standard Clothing Co., \$40,000; Bargain Clothing \$10,000; Dodge Pulley Co., \$20,000.
