Premier Ross' Strong words Received in Ominous Silence.

Anti-Prohibitionist J. R. Stratton Stays away--Temperance said to be killed.

CAUCUS SHUNTS

"Gentlemen, you know my views

were the words of Premier Ross referring to temperance legislation at the adjourned caucus of the Liberal members of the Legislature yesterday. Dr. James, of Nipplesing, was in the chair and the temperance question was the first taken up. The Premier intimated in this

short and pungent sentence his attitude towards any half-way measure for temperance reform. It was expected that the whole matter would be threshed out and a decision come to, but there was an inclination to drop the matter at once. And it was so. And with the cool reception accorded the leauer's suggestion van-ished all hope of anytimes peing done to "banish the bar" from the Pro-

vince of Ontario.

It was significant that Hon. J. R.
Stratton, leader of the anti-prohibition wing of the party, was not present at the caucus. He had other
business down town.

NO TEMPERANCE BILL.

One of the most prominent Lib-erals slitting in the Legislature in-formed the World that there would be no temperance legislation of any sort whatsoever. This remark was endorsed by others ress prominent in the party ranks. The World's informant added:

"This, of course, does not mean that' there will be no license law amendments, but whatever is brought down will hardly come within the designa-tion of 'temperance' legislation. The present act will be changed in some respects to bring about a better en-forcement. There has been a good deal of talk about a split in the party over this suggested temperance; bill, but such is not the case. The party is not united on the best means to abate the evil of intemperance, but to abate the evil of intemperance, but that is generally the situation with regard to every great question. The views of all the members are sought on these questions, and that is just what the caucus is for. The majority rules. Every man has a chance to put forward his ideas and the best put forward his ideas and the best are adopted. The premier is very anxious to have a prohibitory measure enacted, but the great majority are opposed to doing anything more than to improve the present law. The members are not anxious to court defeat by supporting the demands of the temperance people, and for that reason there will be no bill at all. That is the situation to-day, and there is not likely to be any change. I don't think the matter will again be discussed in caucus, and the general feeling of the members is that we have heard the last of it for some time.

"What will the Premier do?" Ask him. No, I don't think he will resign. When a man's views are not entertained by his colleagues he does not throw up the game. He generally submits to the will of the majority, and I imagine that is what Mr. Ross will do, no matter how dis-appointed he may feel."

FEEL BETTER NOW.

The members express considerable rate memoers express considerable relief since a troublesome matter has been disposed of, so far as the caucus is concerned. But the responsible heads are not likely to rest for a while ver They are expecting considerable. yet. They are expecting considerable pressure from the prohibition bodies, wut will now be able to reply to insistent demands for legislation that the government is not able to carry out the program it had drawn up.
