SAKHAROFF KILLED

Female Revolutionist Fires Three Revolver Shots Into Him. London, Dec. 7.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of The Daily Telegraph, in a despatch dated Dec. 5, sent by way of Eydtkuhnen, East Prussia,

says:
"Lieut.-Gen. Sakharoff, former Min ister of War, was assassinated to-day. The Government has deputed Gen. Sakharoff to visit the Province of Sara-Sakharoff to visit the Province of Saratoff for the purpose of quelling the agrarian riots there. A woman belonging to the scalled "flying column" of the revolutionary movement called at the house of the Governor-General of Saratoff at noon to-day and asked to see Gen. Sakharoff.

"She fired three revolver shots at the general, killing him on the spot."

The tiding reached St. Petersburg last night. Count Witte charged Lieut-Gen. Rudiger, Minister of War, with the task of breaking the news to Madame Sakharoff.

The event has created a profound im-Pression in St. Petersburg, owing to fears that the revolutionists here will follow the example thus set.
