Mr. Whitney's attitude in this matter will commend itself to all good citizens who have the welfare of the province in view, and we venture to hope that he will apply the same rule to all appointments. It is exceedingly absurd that, in the province of Ontario, any man should be appointed to public office because he is a member of a church, and we are glad that Mr. Whitney has so promptly and courageously declared against creed having influence upon Government appointments. man should be put in the right place no matter what his creed may be.



Millionaire Member For Fails to Make Go


Montreal, Oct. 4.—Rodolphe Forget he millionaire M. P. for Charlevoix has been asked by a large number of his constituents to resign in one of the most extraordinary letters in the his-

nim that last October he secured elec-tion by boasting of his immense wealth which he was anxious to spend for the benefit of Charlevolx. They remind him that he promised to build quays, rallways, and all sorts of public works,

Not only did Mr. Forget not keep these promises, but he only attended Parliament ten days during the six months' session recently ended.
