May Go to China.

That he expects to visit the new republic of China as well as Japan on his return trip from Australia was the announcement which Hon. George R. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, made before his departure for Vancouver, where he sails on February 19th for the Antipodes.

Having an invitation, he said, from the government of China, as well as from Japan to pay an official visit on my return trip, and if time permits, and nothing extraordinary prevents, I will spend three weeks in China and two weeks in Japan.

My object will be solely to look into the commercial possibilities in those two countries. China with its immense population, with its consumption which is rapidly increasing and opening up the new regime, and with its modern methods and facilities of transportation and industry, presents a particularly good field for the extension of Canadian trade.

Recent Death.

Mrs. D. B. Newcombe, widow of the late David Barnaby Newcombe, died at the residence of her son, E. B. Newcombe, Monday morning at 6 o'clock at the age of 85. WOLFVILLE 7 WINDSOR 5. In the fastest game of hockey seen here this winter, Wolfville defeated Windsor last Friday night at Evangeline rink, by the score of 7-5. The ice was in excellent condition and both teams in fine trim, and the spectators were treated to an interesting and exciting game.

D. Patterson, of Dartmouth, handled the whistle in a very creditable manner and never, at any moment allowed the game to lag. Eaton played for Wolfville and showed his old bursts of speed. Baird, who has been unable to play since the first of the season, was back at his place as rover and put up a fine game, scoring three of Wolfville's goals.

Ragley played his usual steady game. Shaw showed himself more than a match for Patterson. Fraser, although unable to get away on his speedy rushes, got in some effective work and the team missed him badly when he was off the ice. Webster and Sleep played their usual excellent game. Hickey played centre for Windsor and showed himself a fast man. Patterson was in his usual good condition. Dupuy was a tower of strength to the visitors. Sexton played at point, which position does not show off his playing as well as that of rover. Windsor had two goals, one on play by rover and Burbridge on the wing.

The game was a hot one, the teams being up after three minutes strenuous play. Baird scored the first goal. From the puck-off play went to Wolfville's territory. Ragley and Eaton followed. Shaw carried the puck up the ice but failed to score. Play remained around Windsor's goal and Baird scored repeated shots on the net, finally getting past Sullivan for the second goal. Play went to Wolfville's territory, but the puck was soon carried to Windsor's end of the ice where play was at the end of the period.

Ragley found the net two minutes after the beginning of the second period. Ray went to Windsor's territory and where Hickey scored the first goal for the visitors. Shaw immediately retaliated.
