BATH AGAINST INCORPORATION

Fire Company is Organized—Institute Will Present Fire Alarm—Tangle Between Hydro and Telephone Company

A meeting of interest to the citizens of this place was held on Tuesday evening, Oct. 30, to discuss a most important question, namely, whether the village of Bath should or should not seek incorporation. Dr. M. E. Commins was unanimously elected chairman of the meeting and F. M. Gheron was appointed secretary.

Much discussion ensued both pro and con to the motion. When the vote was taken by one vote. Those standing for the motion, 14; against, 15.

This vote will show that though incorporation was defeated it was not by any overwhelming majority. A start has been made; the foe has been broken in the direction of civic government and will most surely be heard of again. Then, if nothing more comes out of it, the method of procedure will at least be certain and correct procedure is certainly a stepping stone of no mean value in any such forward movement.

The appointing of an up-to-date volunteer fire brigade was also taken up at this meeting and the following men were appointed by the meeting and also had their respective positions assigned them.

Furthermore the third section for which the meeting was called was the selection of some suitable fire alarm; whether this should take the form of a bell or be an electric siren, and again as to the location of this said alarm and the system of alarm which would most adequately meet with local requirements. This fire alarm is to be presented to the town by the Women's Institute, and the subject was brought up by them at this meeting, to get the opinion of the so-called sterner sex on the subject.

FINE NEW OFFICES OF N. B. TELEPHONE

Most Elaborate in Town and Good Service is Being Given

Altogether the most attractive suite of business offices in the town are those of the New Brunswick Telephone Co., which during the summer were rebuilt from the old building owned by the Company on Main street. L. E. McFarland had the work in charge and this fact testifies that it was very well done. A new plate glass front was put in, hard wood floors were laid throughout, and the whole street front is devoted to the uses of the company. The walls of the apartment are paneled in heavy board and Douglas fir, the color scheme being for the side walls, a light buff and flat white, with dark stained wood-work. The handsome wainscoting is of natural wood and the ceilings are a neat design in pressed steel, painted in flat white. The public is shut off from the operators' room by a neat railing with narrow counter top. At the left is a commodious room occupied by Manager Britton. At the right there is a booth for public toll service. A two position switch-board, capable of accommodating several hundreds of subscribers, occupies a convenient location in the main room. Off of this room there is also a large store room used for surplus supplies needed by the Company and there are also conveniently located lavatories. The office gets light from the street at the east, while the west windows look out upon the river. It is doubtful if the company have anywhere in a town so small as Hartland, an office so elaborate or fitted in a more modern way.

Mrs. Pearl Thornton is the capable and obliging chief operator. Her staff consists of Miss Margaret Lewis and Miss Isabel Hallett, day operators, while Miss Marion Donkin is night operator.

Strange to say Saturday was the Editor's first visit to a local telephone exchange, and as he watched the operators at their skillful manipulations of plugs and cords and various dings, which he knew not the use of, there came to him a new respect for the girls, who were sometimes termed cranky and incompetent. The writer does not know whether it was one of their busy hours or not. If it was not he would like to be present to see the girls move when they are really busy. There are some who claim that our telephone service is not what it should be. The Observer strongly advises the complaining ones to visit the office at some busy hour and see if they, the complainers, could themselves do better at the work. The installation and the up-keep of the equipment, like that at Hartland, runs into a great deal of money and if subscribers complain that more operators should be employed, they must remember that every additional operator calls for additional equipment and wages and that the subscribers would have to pay for it in the end.

TOWN'S LOOKS BEING IMPROVED

Not so Many New Buildings as Former Years But Many Attractions Added

While during the past season the number of new buildings has not been so great as in former years, there has, nevertheless, been a great many improvements on buildings already erected. The completion of the magnificent residence of Dr. Macintosh on Prince and Main streets adds greatly to the attraction of the town and it is quite easily the finest residence within the county.

M. L. Hayward, Esq., has had a miracle wrought upon what he himself would have termed his humble dwelling with a magnificent broad verandah extending across the front and along the whole south side and the ell, and other attractions added, together with neat painting in a delightful shade of green, makes the residence rank well up among the best of houses on Main street, which is being noted for its comfortable and handsome homes.

What was known as the old Nevess place in the heart of the town and which is one of the very oldest buildings here, is the property of H. E. Adams. The old house was one of the early styles, the fashion of a hundred years ago, but it was well built, roomy and hospitable in appearance. For years it was beautified by a covering of ivy, but now the old building is being so changed that its oldest friends will have difficulty in recognizing it when the work is completed. Large windows have been placed in front and a verandah luxuriously broad and inviting has been built across the south side. The three buildings specifically mentioned in this article are not the whole of our Main street improvements. It has been mentioned before that L. H. Glass, J. W. Montgomery and others have added to the appearance of their properties. The extension of broad concrete side walks is a pleasing feature and from end to end the Main street of today can hardly be recognized as that which the village of Hartland boasted as its chief thoroughfare ten years ago. All the improvements that have been made cost money.

The Observer made considerable extensions last year and it knows what that cost is, but all the improvements, together, and those which will be done in the next year and in years soon to come, will make the street one of which the town can be thoroughly proud. This article has treated especially of the Main street, but there have been other improvements on all streets and the residential section of the highlands is being beautified quite as much as the rest of the town.

The appearance of Burt's Flat, so-called, will be wonderfully changed before the flowers of next spring bloom.
