LOCAL MATTERS.

FAT HEIFER.—Last Thursday
Mr. H. H. Fawcett killed a heifer
one year and eleven months old
which dressed 54 pounds, and had
sixty-seven pounds of rough tallow.

A STRIKE.—Mr. Charles Faw-
cett's workmen have struck for in-
creased wages, as no advance in
their pay has been made since the
reduction was made two or three
years ago.

A CATTLE received yesterday from
Mr. Charles Ford, who accompanied
the recent cattle shipment from
Sackville, is as follows: "Arrived.
Cattle in excellent condition. One
ox died on passage."

DEAL SHIPMENTS.—Mr. M. G.
Cole and others have been running
the Goodwin mill, near the Colonial
Copper Mine since the first of the
year, and have already shipped four
carriages of deals to St. John. They
will hold the balance of their win-
ter's cut till the roads are better.

BIG FISH.—A school of grampus
whales got in shallow water on the
shore at Harvey Albert county, last
week, and seventeen were killed and
captured. The whole village turned
out with guns, axes, &c. The
grampus averaged 700 pounds each
and yielded nearly 100 gallons of oil.

A PILGRIMAGE.—The Holy Cross
Fathers of St. Joseph's college
Memramook, have organized a
pilgrimage to St. Anne de Beaupre,
Quebec, in June next. This is
the first organized pilgrimage from
New Brunswick, and seven or eight
hundred are expected to join the
party.

HOUSE BURNED.—Mr. Mayhew
Milton's house, at Fairfield, was
destroyed by fire Monday evening.
Mr. Milton was from home at the
time, and his wife, who had gone to
a neighbor's for a few minutes, found
the house in flames on her return.
Only a small portion of the furniture
was saved. Insured for \$150.

PERSONAL.—Senator Balfour has
been confined to his house with
erysipelas. "Squire John Ford had
an attack of apoplexy last Thursday
morning, but is slowly recovering."
Mr. T. H. Prescott is in the em-
ploy of the Boston & Maine Railway
Co., at East Boston. Mr. Charles
G. Hart has been appointed agent
for Mr. Joseph Finlay, St. John.

LEG BROKEN.—Mr. Turner Bre-
ker had the misfortune to break
both bones of one leg by throwing
himself from a runaway horse at the
railway crossing near Cole's Island
last Thursday. The horse took
flight at a train which came up be-
hind it, and Mr. Breker threw him-
self off rather than risk being struck
by the engine. The horse crossed
the track in safety just ahead of the
train. Mr. Breker believes that but
for the action taken by him, both
himself and the horse would have
been killed.

Gymnastic Exhibition.

A very interesting gymnastic
competition took place in the new
Gymnasium on Saturday afternoon,
and was witnessed by a large num-
ber of spectators. Eleven students
of the College and Male Academy
took part in the exercises, which
consisted of dumb bell practice,
swinging, performing on the
parallel and horizontal bars, etc.,
and the efficiency displayed after
only three months' practice was an
excellent testimonial to the skill of
Mr. Kerr as a trainer. The prizes
consisted of a gold medal and two
silver medals furnished by the
Faculty, and several pocket knives,
cans, belts, etc., donated by private
parties. The first prize for all round
excellence was awarded to Mr.
Munich, and the second to Mr.
Dawson. First prize in Dumb Bell
and Indian Clubs, Mr. McCoy.
Second, Mr. Casey; Horizontal Bars,
Mr. White; Parallel Bars, Mr. She-
field. The Judges, Prof. Hunter
and Messrs. McDonald and Pickett,
also awarded prizes to the three
juvenile competitors, giving first
place to Master McIntosh, and
awarding prizes of equal value to
Masters Thompson and Tingley.
The Faculty are to be commended
for obtaining such an efficient in-
structor as Mr. Kerr, and on the
success of their efforts to furnish
physical as well as mental training
for the students of M. Allison.

Twenty-Four O'clock.

In connection with the new system
of time notation shortly to be adopt-
ed on the I. C. R. by the Canadian
week, we give below a diagram show-
ing the arrangement of the new num-
bers.

The day begins and ends at mid-
night as before, and the hours from
noon to midnight are counted from 12 to 24
instead of from 1 to 12.

Paper deals, with the new after-
noon numbers 13 to 24 are furnished
for both clocks and watches.

Wood Point.

—H. G. Atkinson Esq., arrived
from Point de Bute, accompanied on
route to buy horses for the firm of
B. A. Atkinson & Co.

—The Atlantic Stone Company
have quite a number of men at work
now, an American schooner is now
taking in a load of stone at their
wharf for the U. S. market.

—Much interest is felt by the
family of Robert Smith who shipped
in the ill-fated schooner Clotilde re-
ported as seen drifting bottom up,
by an American fishing schooner,
being that the Clotilde was lumber
laden last autumn but did not sail
and her deck load was frozen down
and could not be removed, which in
a small way caused her to careen
easily.

—Mr. Roberts, of the New York
Free Stone Company is pushing for-
ward work with the usual com-
mandable Yankee push. Already a dwel-
ling house for his men 34 by 25 is
rapidly approaching completion, to
be ready for occupation by the end
of the present month. A black-
smith shop fully equipped is already
turning out work. Cranes for hoist-
ing have been erected and the engine
just arrived is being got into posi-
tion. Already some 25 or 30 men
have found employment here and a
number more will be employed as
soon as the Company are fully
equipped for work.

—Nellie, daughter of Mr. John
McFarlane, keeper of the lighthouse
on Amet Island, died on the island
last Thursday. With much diffi-
culty, owing to ice in the strait, the
remains were brought to Wallace on
Monday for interment. The young
lady was about seventeen years of
age. She had been residing with
her parents, the senior, and went on
the island during the winter to visit
her mother who was and still is
sick. During her illness, her
father was her only attendant. The
isolation of these living on the little
island is sometimes a rather trying
thing. The death of Miss Mc-
Farlane, who was a favorite with
her young friends, has cast quite a
gloom over the community.

Oxford.

—A very sad drowning accident
occurred here on Saturday last,
April 30th. Two young boys went
to the bank of the river to catch
smelts, when a portion of the bank
gave way and the boys fell in. One
only son of Mr. James Grey was
thrown in the river. An alarm was
given and immediate search made
for the body, and continued through
Friday and Monday, and on Tues-
day all of the factories and mills
shut down and about two hundred
grappled the river for miles but with-
out avail and up to time of writing
(Wednesday) the body has not been
found. The bereaved parents have
the sympathy of the entire com-
munity.

—On Tuesday evening last the
children of the Oxford school under
the careful training of their teachers
Miss Francis Grey and Miss Minnie
Schumacher, and the able leadership
of principal W. R. Slade gave a
very entertaining concert in the old
Methodist Church. The programme
consisted of singing, recitations,
dramas, debates, &c., &c., and
the children were highly creditable
to teacher and scholar so that
one part in its way cannot be
said to surpass the other. At the
close of the concert a vote of
thanks was heartily tendered the
teachers, and the community
may justly be proud of the rapid
progress our young are making un-
der their tutors. The object of the
concert was to procure a bell for the
school house and although we have
not the exact figures, we think it
must have netted \$20. When shall
we hear their merry voices again?

Bale Verte.

—The bay is clear of ice. Two
schooners sailed from Port Elgin
for P. E. Island on Monday.

—The happy relief, in the shape
of herrings, have arrived, the first
boat load was landed on Tuesday
morning. Points de Bute and Lof-
fouche take notice.

—Acres and acres of wild flow-
ers to be seen every day majestically
floating on the beautiful waters of
our bay, but so far the almonds
have not been able to capture many.
The hawk of the wild goose is to be
heard every night.

—Mr. Hazen Copp's steam mill
will commence sawing in a few days.
His men are now busily engaged
stream driving large quantities of
logs. The large Hiramtha owned
by the above gentleman is on her
way here from Demerara to load
deals for United Kingdom.

—It is rumored that a syndicate
consisting of George of Sackville,
Cochran of Demerara, Robert of
Lumberland, N. S., Hewson of Port
Elgin and others has been formed
and have taken possession of Read
& Son's woollen mills, which will
commence work about the 20th
instant. It is to be hoped the re-
sult will be successful.

—Messrs. Marvin & Ogden, doing
business in Port Elgin as traders,
have assigned to Mr. Chas. G.
Hart, of St. John. Liabilities about
\$1200. Assets nearly the same.
Cause of failure, being pressed by a
St. John merchant and not able to
collect at this season of the year.
If it is thought this young firm, whose
business transactions have been able
in a short time to become business,
butcher, hastily bid adieu to his
many creditors and took train for
the land of refuge on Thursday
evening last. For several days and
immediately before shipping, he by
plausible stories too well succeeded
in victimizing a large number of
his obliging friends by borrowing
from them sums of money ranging
from \$5 to \$50, and is supposed in
this way alone to have taken and
left him over \$1000. Quite a num-
ber of persons in and around Port
Elgin who kindly lent their names
to assist this infamous absconder,
are now being called upon by the
holders of the paper to ante up.
Rather pleasant business this join-
ing and endorsing notes.

—Mr. Racey, agent of the Mer-
chant Bank, is making a sojourn at
Truro.

—The Custom office of Rockland
is to be abolished, no business being
done there now. In place of it, an
office is to be appointed to look after
the revenue in the Petitedio and
down the bay, and for this purpose
he is to have a small cutter. It is
rumored that Mr. Stevens, the col-
lector at Hillsboro, will have this
position and that he will be suc-
ceeded by Mr. John Wallace, of Hill-
boro.

ST. JOHN, May 5th.—Water in
the St. John River was never so high.
Indian town is flooded and men go to
business in canoes. Bridges, etc.,

years ago a natural death. Frederick
Dandall, a lunatic escaped from the

THOIS PYTOLES, May 5th.—A snow
slide threw the west-bound accommo-
dation off the track. Fireman Lasouche
killed.

NANIBO, B. C. May 5.—A terrible
explosion took place in No. 1 shaft
V. C. Coal mine. It is supposed that
100 men were in the mine at the
time. Up to midnight 12 bodies had
been taken out, some dead others
fatally or seriously injured. Little
hopes of recovering any more. The
mine is now on fire, woodwork
about air shaft all burnt. The scene
in the vicinity of the shaft is heart-
rending.
