ROBLIN RAILWAY DEAL.

Strong Opposition Brought Out in the Railway Committee This Morning.

USURPING POWERS OF DOMINION.

OTTAWA, April 26.—The Railway Committee this morning resumed consideration of the Roblin contract with the Canadian Northern Railway. Wallace Nesbitt, counsel for Manitoba interests opposed to the deal, objected to the clause giving the Lieut. Governor the Council control of rates to points in Ontario, and dwelt at great length on the liability the province was assuming in guaranteeing bonds and working expenses, in which they were absolutely at the mercy of the contractors.

Mr. Blair asked if they could not put in a rider providing that the province would only fix rates within the limits of the Railway Act.

Mr. Nesbitt replied that the Provincial Government did not want that. Roblin wanted complete control.

Mr. Blair—Do you mean they want

power to do something unfair to the other provinces?

Mr. Nesbitt—Yes; and read the clause providing that the interests of the Co. should be the first consideration. He dwelt on the fact that the Canadian Northern was to be a trans-continental line, and included bridges across the frontier. These were points they would find hard to get over, and points on which the Federal Parliament was supreme. The bill meant complete abrogation of the Dominion Parliament's attributes for thirty years.

D. W. Bole, of Winnipeg, next addressed the committee on behalf of public sentiment in Manitoba and in opposition to the bill, backed by the protests from 17 constituencies. The transportation grievance in the province, he contended, did not demand this remedy. He was still talking at one o'clock when the committee adjourned till Tuesday.

SOME MINDS MADE EASY.

The Eastern Canadian Mining Co. Has Made Arrangements

To Vigorously Prosecute Work on Waldo Placer.

Maritime Holders of Pooled Certificates Pleased Over Result.

MONTREAL, April 26.—Walter Morehead of London, Eng., chairman of the Eastern Canadian Mining Company, who has been in the city for some days, announced to-day that sufficient capital had been procured within the past few days to start the company's dredges at the Waldo placer, Oregon. It is the intention to start operations at once on the Waldo, on which the Company will concentrate its efforts. Mr. Morehead says that \$1,000,000 is in sight. The proposal is that all holders for the value of pooled certificates will receive fully paid up shares in the company without further assessment. This will be good news to a large number of Maritime Province people holding pooled certificates.

YACHTING MATTERS

A New Flyer to be Built Here—A Banner Season at St. John

It is stated in yachting circles that a new flyer is to be built, work upon which will be commenced at once. She is designed for a cup winner and will make a valuable addition to the Fredericton fleet.

The Globe says that the season ahead is going to be a banner one in yachting circles in and about St. John. The steady advance of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club to a position of self support, in fact affluence, seldom if ever attained before by any sporting organization in St. John, has so stimulated interest in the white-winged pastime that many who never dreamed of becoming enthusiastic sailors, let alone owning a share in a neat little craft, are now found among the eager throng these afternoons at Millidgeville, cleaning, refitting, painting and otherwise making ready their various yachts for the opening of the season in a few weeks hence.

Generally throughout the fleet there will be quite a number of changes this year. Several well known boats have changed owners, and, with some, rigs are being altered, sail areas increased, keels made differently, and such changes made as is thought will either increase speed, or add to comfort. Every yachtsman has his own hobby, and to listen to a crowd of these amateur tars dilating upon the chances of their respective yachts in the summer race would almost turn the head of a "landlubber."

There are now 187 members in good standing in the club, and it is expected before the season is far advanced the 200 mark will be overstepped.

The club fixtures for this season include the annual cruise to Fredericton, on July 15th to 22nd.
