## York County Council Deals With Tuberculosis Question

Committee Appointed to Look Into Proposal from Anti-Tuberculosis Association to Establish a Sanatorium—Scott Act Inspector Makes His Report and Claim Against County for Costs in a Scott Act Case is Urged.

The York County Council on Wednesday afternoon heard a delegation from the York County Anti-Tuberculosis Association, who asked that the council vote an annual grant towards the establishment of a municipal sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis cases, as provided for in legislation passed at the last session of the legislature.

An alternative proposition to have the council appoint a committee to enquire into the question was also put forward and it was that proposition which the council adopted. The committee will report at the July session of the council when it is expected that some definite action in the matter will be taken.

The rest of the afternoon was taken up in listening to the semi-annual report of the Scott Act Inspector, W. L. McFarlane, and carrying on the usual routine business.

Dr. G. C. VanWart, Dr. W. H. Irvine, Judge Barry and Dr. S. F. A. Vainwright formed the committee who addressed the council and urged upon the council the necessity of dealing with tuberculosis as a dread disease.

The necessity of taking up this work was strongly pressed upon the council, Judge Barry expressing the view that where money was being spent in bringing immigrants to the country some might be well spent in saving the people we now have from contracting this dread disease which would quickly carry them off.

The work of other communities in taking active steps to ameliorate conditions was pointed out and it was urged that the council either set aside a sum of money annually to aid in establishing a sanatorium or else appoint a committee to deal with the matter.

Warden Stone declared that in his opinion tuberculosis cases should be handled along the same lines as other kinds of contagious diseases. He hoped the time was not far off when the county would be able to put in such a plan as suggested.

On motion of Coun. Colter a vote of thanks was tendered the delegation, and on Coun. Essence's motion it was decided to refer the matter to a special committee to report at the July session.

## MAKE MONTREAL IMPROVED PARIS

Drastic Changes Proposed by  
Mayorality Candidate—Sunday  
Sale of Liquor

Montreal, Jan. 17.—An element of brightness and joyousness has been sadly lacking in the mayorality contest this year, as suddenly introduced into it this morning, when Dr. Gustave Tasse, of 13 Phillips Square, promulgated the most novel and "advanced" platform that has been seen in such a contest for a generation.

If elected to the mayorality, Dr. Tasse undertakes to change the statute law of both Dominion and province in several important particulars, and if necessary to amend the British North America Act. He proposed to run the city upon the lines of a revised and improved edition of Paris, (France). He will get after the "interests" until the best of the city, and half a score of cherished institutions of the city of Montreal will be decapitated.

The platform includes: Abolition of the city council; the municipality to be administered and governed solely by the board of control; compulsory education.

The abolition of the property qualification for all civic offices.

The establishment of a segregated district and a license system for social vice.

The establishment of civic music halls for light entertainments of good quality, in which light alcoholic liquors will be served.

The opening of all licensed places for the sale of liquor on Sunday with considerable increase in their taxation.

The opening of theatres and all places of amusement on Sunday.

The opening of all departmental stores from eight to twelve on Sunday in order to give the workman a chance to do his own buying.

Full taxation of all church property.

Municipal ownership of all public utilities.
