DISPOSITION OF CARNEGIE GRANT IS BEING CONSIDERED

University of New Brunswick Interested in Disposition of Fund.

CHANCELLOR C. C. JONES AT HALIFAX TO-DAY

Failure of Federation Proposal Resulted in Educational Appropriation.

Chancellor C. C. Jones, of the University of New Brunswick, is in Halifax to-day, where he is representing the University of New Brunswick at the meeting of the Central Advisory Committee of the colleges of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. Following the failure of the federation scheme suggested by the Carnegie Corporation, under which the various colleges of the Maritime Provinces would be grouped within a central university at Halifax, the Carnegie Corporation appropriated a large sum for the assistance of higher education. The Central Advisory Committee was formed of representatives of the various colleges for the purpose of recommending the disposition of this fund.

Delaware University has already profited to the extent of \$200,000 for a ten-year period towards the support of its law school, the grant being made retroactive so as to provide \$100,000 to meet deficits of the past five years and the remainder for the subsequent five-year period. St. Francis Xavier and Acadia have also received grants in addition to Prince Edward Island. It is expected that the University of New Brunswick will also come in for some consideration, probably at the present meeting.

HORSE DESTROYED IN THREATENING FIRE DURING GALE

Barn Owned by W. W. Boyce, York St., Destroyed by Blaze of Suspicious Origin.

LOCATED NEAR SCENE OF FORMER FIRES

Fire Was Discovered Suddenly During Height of Sudden Gale.

Fire, which broke out during the height of last night's gale, completely gutted the barn owned by W. W. Boyce, located at the rear of his business premises on York street near the C. P. R. station, and immediately in front of the Palmer-McLellan Shoe Company's factory. A horse stabled in the building was smothered to death by the dense smoke before the arrival of the fire department.

The blaze was discovered a few minutes after 11 o'clock when an alarm was rung in from Box No. 6 at the corner of Argyle and York streets. Less than ten minutes before Edwin Hall and Charles Toner had passed the building en route to their homes but had failed to notice anything unusual. Barely had they reached their homes before the alarm sounded and the building burst forth in flames which lit up the sky.

Efforts were made to reach the horse stabled in the barn but its struggles ceased shortly after the first arrivals had opened the door to be (Continued on Page Five.)

\$1,500 GALE DAMAGE TO BUILDING AT THE EXHIBITION GROUND

Wild Gale Destroys Portion of Roof and Gable Wall Collapsed.

MANY TREES WERE ALSO DAMAGED

Fredericton experienced one of the wildest gales of the season last night. Swooping down on the city the gale rocked buildings with the full force of its blast shortly before 11 o'clock. At the Exhibition Grounds the large concrete building used for the purposes of the automobile and poultry shows was badly wrecked by the onslaught. A large section of the roof was torn away and with this support zone a section of the gable (Continued on Page Five.)
