Parliamentary. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. MONDAY, APRIL 3.

A Bill to amend the law relating to public wharves and bridges was read a second time, and referred to a Committee of the whole House.

Hon. Mr. Mc Donald said the object of the Bill was to remedy a defect which existed in the present law.
