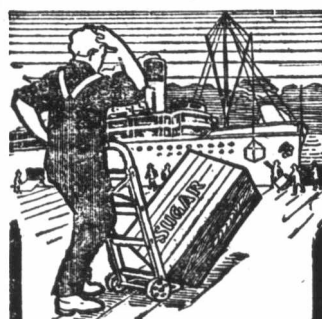

Says Hard Times Are Seen Ahead

Montreal Clothing Factories
Are Closing down

Montreal, May 19.—Three Mon-
treil clothing factories have closed
down. Three more are running short
time; several have laid off men. By
these indications and the fact that
travellers report retailers time not
buying the trade concludes hard
times are ahead. No drastic cut in
prices is expected this fall, but
is looked for with certainty next
spring. Retailers are stocked up
with spring clothes which the incle-
ment weather has checked the de-
mand for, with the result they will
have to keep them over. All indica-
tions point to the conclusion that the
public are not prepared to buy at
present prices, and will maintain
that attitude in the fall, with the
consequence that to obtain money
by spring, retailers will be forced to
sell at a sacrifice and manufac-
turers will be forced to cut profits
in order to induce them to re-stock.

The feeling here is that the de-
pression will not last longer than
two seasons, so that by the end of
1921 business will be on the up grade
again. The labor situation is pow-
erful factor, and as conditions in
Canada, and especially in the Pro-
vince of Quebec, appear more stable
than in the United States, and there
is every evidence that the British
will flow in to develop natural re-
sources, it is felt by business men
versed in economics that Canada
will weather the storm well. "We
are sliding down into one of the
valleys now," said one, "but there
will be no disaster." The bottom
will be reached quickly and prices
will move up though they may not
again reach the high peak from
which they are falling now.

New York, May 19.—Telegraphic
reports to the Evening Sun from the
leading industrial centres where the
necessaries of life are produced are
to the effect that the crest of the
high prices has been reached in the
United States, and in many instances
passed.

Boston, May 19.—Price reductions
ranging from fifteen to fifty per cent.
were advertised today by various
retail stores. Most of the reductions
were in clothing, but one large de-
partment store announced also a re-
duction of twenty-five per cent. on
lines of cottons, blankets, linens and
other goods. A store specializing in
women's clothing displayed window
cards proclaiming that everything
was cut one-half in price.

Youngstown, Ohio, May 19.—A
reduction of twenty per cent in
prices of nearly all goods was an-
nounced today by one of the large
downtown department stores.

Omaha, Neb., May 19.—Auto
dealers and dentists to-day announ-
ced material reductions in their prices
while among the larger department
stores all but one had placed on sale
their entire or greater portion of
their stocks at discounts ranging
from 20 to 50 per cent. Several shoe
dealers also announced discounts of
one fifth of the selling price. Sev-
eral dentists advertised a twenty
five per cent. reduction on all charges.

Fresno, Calif., May 19.—General
reductions on silk goods of twenty-
five per cent. were announced by
retailers in advertisements published
today.

Cheyenne, Wyo., May 19.—Reduc-
tion of fifteen per cent. on the prices
of all dry goods and clothing, effec-
tive today, was announced by one
merchant here.

Kansas City, May 19.—The bank-
ers of the United States are deter-
mined there shall be no more \$25
shoes and \$150 clothes. Richard S.
Hawes, St. Louis, president of the
Bankers Association, told the annual
convention of the Missouri Bankers'
Association here yesterday. He urged
the bankers to refrain from lending
money for speculation in food and
land.

The Caterpillar Pest

In certain sections of the eastern United States the notorious European Corn Borer has become established and in view of the grave danger of this serious foreign pest being brought into Canada, the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, has issued a special circular dealing with this insect and others which bore in corn and which may be mistaken for it. This has been prepared by Mr. Arthur Gibson, Chief of the Division of Field Crop and Garden Insects. It comprises 14 pages and has seven illustrations. A limited edition only of this circular has been printed. Agricultural workers and others specially interested may obtain copies free of charge on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

CHARLES ROBINSON MANAGER
At a special meeting of the execu-
tive of the St. John Exhibition Asso-
ciation, with E. A. Schofield presid-
ing, Charles Robinson was appoint-
ed manager for this year's fair. R.
R. Patchel was appointed superinten-
dent of grounds. Various matters
in regard to the conduct of the ex-
hibition were considered, and it was
also decided to increase the cost
of admission to fifty cents for chil-
dren, a gain of 100 per cent. over
the former rates.
